### High Commissioner Dined.

Board of Trade Entertains Hon. Sir Edgar Bowring, N.H.C.

At eight o'clock last evening, at Smithville, Hon. Sir Edgar Bowring was dined by the Newfoundland Board of Trade, Mr. J. J. McKay, its President, occupying the chair. Present as guests were: The Premier, Hon. Sir M. P. Cashin, Hon. W. J. Higgins, Speaker of the House of Assembly, Sir P. T. McGrath, President of the Legislative Council, H. W. LeMessurier, Esq., C.M.G., Deputy Minister of Customs, M. Suzor, Consul for France, J. S. Benedict, Esq., United States Consul, Sir Jos. Outerbridge, and representatives of the Press. About 100 members of the Board were present, and following a repast which was in every way worthy of Smithville, the following toast list was gone through:

"The King"—Prop. The Chairman; "God Save the King."  
"Hon. Sir E. R. Bowring, High Commissioner"—Prop. The President; Resp. Sir E. R. Bowring.

"Newfoundland and Her Industries"—Prop. Hon. A. F. Goodridge; Resp. R. B. Job, Esq.

"The Legislature"—Prop. W. S. Monroe, Esq.; Resp. Hon. Sir M. P. Cashin.

"Our Guests"—Prop. H. R. Brookes; Resp. Sir P. T. McGrath, Hon. W. J. Higgins, Consul Suzor and Benedict.

The orchestra was provided by Mr. and Mrs. Eadie (Madame Olive Timmons) the latter and Mr. Arthur Williams also contributed songs.

An interesting feature of the evening was the speech by Hon. A. F. Goodridge, now 80 years of age and 67 years actively identified with the country's trade.

Hon. Sir Edgar Bowring, in an interesting speech, told of his work in London as Newfoundland High Commissioner. Describing the inaugurating of the offices at 58 Victoria Street, he told that he spent from four to five hours every day giving out information of the country. Many questions of Newfoundland are asked and one gentleman, Mr. Wingate, had offered to expend \$500,000 to build a breakwater across the Strait of

Belle Isle to cut off the Arctic current and turn it away from our shores. Sir Edgar also referred to the appointment of Mr. Victor Gordon to the position of Secretary. Every Newfoundland in London should drop into the Commissioner's office, especially business people seeking information. The work of disposing the Escason's million-and-a-quarter dollars worth of fish was touched upon. The benefits that would accrue to Newfoundland was the proper information of the country disseminated, was mentioned by the speaker. Without doubt Newfoundland has the right man in the right place, with Sir Edgar Bowring as High Commissioner.

### Man's Narrow Escape.

An elderly man came near to suffering a bad accident yesterday afternoon when he was knocked down by a horse and box-car. The horse was going at a fast trot when turning into the arch leading to the wharf, and the driver did not call out or give any warning.

### Vultures Sent to Prison

This is the second time they have been sentenced for the same period for a similar offence. The evidence of a young girl who stayed at the house in question was taken and showed that the place had been visited nightly by a number of well-known citizens for months past.

S.S. Rosalind left Halifax 3 p.m. yesterday, and is due to-morrow morning.

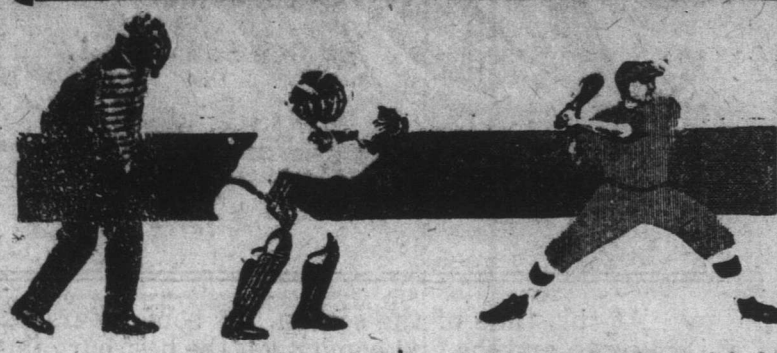
S.S. Adolph is due to-morrow morning to this port direct from New York with full general cargo.

Ranking under the defeat which they received at the hands of Grand Falls the night previous, the St. John's team stepped out upon the diamond last evening fully determined to retrieve their loss. With that wisdom for which he is noted, Manager Hartnett patched up the holes in his infield by playing Canning on third in place of Orr who is out of the game temporarily through spike wounds, and switching Kelly to right field in place of Brett who took Phelan's position at centre.

With Walter Callahan and Hiltz as battery for the home team, and Bill Slocum twirling for the paper-men, "play ball" was called by Umpire Shepleigh sharp at 6 o'clock with another record attendance of fans present to watch hostilities. The City boys went to bat first but nothing resulted from their efforts. The visitors then had their turn but failed to find Callahan's offerings. In the second innings each scored a run. Then the St. John's lads started to murder Slocum, and when the barrage was lifted five of them had crossed the plate in safety. This seemed to jazz the opposing batters when they got in for quick succession. A couple of errors in the fourth let in two more for the capital, and a timely hit brought in a G.F. runner from third. With the game on ice, the home team again batted freely for three runs more, and soured the pitcher by the big lead the inland towners came up to the attack and by dint of hitting the batsmen's heads gently falling none of the batters could find the curves of either pitcher with any degree of accuracy. The St. John's team got another run in the eighth, and in order to wind up the evening's clash Grand Falls poked over one in their last.

### Labor Will Enter Candidates.

The meeting of the N. I. W. A., held last night to consider the present political situation and decide what part being introduced that would remedy the situation, was presided over by Mr. T. M. White, and attended by only a small gathering. A motion proposed by Mr. W. Dunne, and seconded by Mr. Gordon Williams, that the time is opportune to put labor candidates in the field, was adopted unanimously. The motion was spoken to by Messrs. E. J. Whitty, P. Bennett, J. Cadwell, P. Squires, Warwick Smith, M. Foley, O. K. Nelson, J. Jones, W. Willar, G. Tucker, T. Noel, and M. Chipman. In the course of their remarks the different speakers pointed out that representative labor members in the House of Assembly would result in measures of reform that would remedy the existing evils and result in betterment in various ways to the working classes. It was pointed out that the candidates must be those of labor only and have no connections whatever with any other party. It was decided to get busy at once and a committee of twenty, to organize matters, was appointed as follows: Messrs. Cadwell, Whitty, Willar, Tucker, M. Healey, Bennett, W. Dunne, L. Ashley, T. Noel, J. Farlong, J. Squires, W. Nault, Chipman, E. Chapter, M. Malone, Lundrigan, Ed. Ryan, W. Boyles, Waterfield and G. Williams. The President was offered membership on the Committee, but refused, pointing out that he was taking no part in political movements, and Messrs. Smith, O. K. Nelson and French also declined. The committee, which has power to add to its numbers, will meet on Thursday at 8 p.m. in the L.S.P. U. Hall, which it is hoped to have other labor workers present and the matter of financing, etc., will be dealt with. Later a meeting will be held in the Casino Theatre and the candidates nominated.

NEW RAILWAY PLAN.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 2.

Private ownership and operation of railroads in a number of regional systems under strict government control with strikes and lock outs of railroad employees prohibited, is the plan for permanent railroad legislation submitted to the Senate to-day by Senator Cumming Chairman of the Interstate Commerce Committee.

### COLLECTING VIEWS.

LONDON, Sept. 2.

The Chronicle has been collecting an interesting series of views on an increase of output from labor leaders in the country. These men insist that the profiteer must first be dealt with. Despite increased wages the workers are getting relatively small recompense for their labor.

### RESTRICTIONS LIFTED.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 2.

Practically all restrictions against trade with Hungary were lifted to-day by the War Trade Board. It was announced that license for the export of American made goods to that country would be issued freely on all commodities except those of a strictly military nature and that imports to the United States would be practically unrestricted.

### JOINT CONFERENCE IN OCTOBER.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 2.

President Wilson to-morrow will send out invitations for the proposed conference between labor, capital and agriculture for some time in October. It was learned to-day that the White House.

### BULGARIAN TERMS.

PARIS, Sept. 2.

The Peace treaty to be offered by Bulgaria, says the Temps, contains an article by which Bulgaria will bind itself to accept future decision by the powers with regard to Thrace and the Aegean Sea.

### REFUSES TO ACCEPT.

PARIS, Sept. 2.

Rumania will not sign the peace treaty with Austria, according to a transigent, because of a clause introduced at the formal request of the American Delegation, concerning ethnic minorities. Rumania takes exception to a clause regulating treaties, commerce and railroad rates. The Intransigents say consider that it would be undignified for the resignation of J. J. Batiano is imminent.

### IN THE CANADIAN COMMONS.

OTTAWA, Sept. 2.

Copies of the Peace Treaty and documents relating thereto were tabled in the House this afternoon by Robert Borden. The speaker read telegram he had received from President Paderewski of Poland expressing his best wishes for the prosperity

of the world.

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
