Although several people have herring nets out, but a small quantity of herring has been taken, and the few fish netted were certainly welcomed.

Most of the men are engaged in getting home wood now at every available opportunity. Last year the majority of our people were finished "crusading" by this time, but this is a very backward spring and very few trips have been made as yet.

Wednesday morning proving calm for a short while, many people were out in search of seals, but owing to the brief calm only two or three young seals were killed, although several were seen.

Mr. Allan Burden met with a very serious accident on Tuesday. While engaged in repairing a wharf some of the outside beams and longers rolled off the edge of the wharf planning Allan under the water. Fortunately some men were nearby to help extricate him from his position—his father who was present being unable to do so—otherwise a tragedy would have been inevitable. Luckily no bones were broken, but time will be required to put everything to rights again.

Two or three of our men have gone to Grand Falls in search of employment. But in view of the "cut in wages and the permanent boarding price, there is no longer anything in the money-making line at the Paper City.
