ESCAPED CONVICT CAPTURED AFTER TWO YEARS OF FREEDOM.

"Alongside the wall were four rifle-I in charge of a gang of trusties. We picked a favorable morning when the wind would be blowing in the diection of the southeast tower. We planned to fire the barns so that the smoke material would obstruct the view of the men in the lower side. We gathered enough material in the power house to make a ladder. We hid the material, which was three by fours in the barn.

"At eleven-thirty on the morning of Monday, September 10, 1923, we sneaked away from the mason gang and went to the barn. The only one there was the stable keeper who was up for 15 years. We invited him to come with us but he refused as he was up for parole. We had to tie him up so he could not give the alarm. We tied his hands but not his feet so he could walk out of the barn when we had set it afire.

Guards Opened Fire.

"We made a ladder with the material we had gathered then went upstairs and set the barn afire in several places. It burned fast and the smoke was good and thick. We put the ladder against the wall and climbed up and over. When we were on top the riflemen opened fire on us from the towers.

The outside gang started firing too. Everybody was shooting at us. Forty feet from the prison wall is a millionaire's estate. Painters were working on it. They had a car. We Ad in. MacMillan drove it. All the ks. scouts, guards and everybody in the prison were firing at us. Mac-Millan was shot through the hand. They chased us in another car. When we got to the woods we jumped out and made our way through the woods and escaped. Mac dropped from loss of blood and was picked up that night. We hid in barns, bushes and moved at night, keeping away from farm houses and roads. We had no food

and suffered severe hardships. "About 12 miles from the penitentiary we were in a barn and the farmer came in looking for eggs. He saw Brown and asked if he was one of the hoys (meaning the escaped presoners). Brown said no, but he looked as if he knew. We asked him for something to eat, but when he red to go alone we wouldn't let He said he had only a blind wife in his house. He was afraid we'd kill him. He gave us each something. We beat it to the railroad and had in the bushes for three days, until we were sure the hunt for us was over. We knew by that time that they wouldn't search any more box cars. so we hopped a freight to Belleville, as far as the freight went. Then we hid in the bushes some more.



Simpson has been sought by the Toronto and federal authorities over two years. His arrest in Nev York last night closes a hunt that has been going on for over two years Simpson, along with Ryan, Edward McMullen, Wyoming bank rob-Arthur Sullivan, alias Brown, and Wm. Bryant, made a sensationa flight over the walls at Kingston peni tentiary on September 10, 1923. Ryan's Capture.

No trace of the four men was again

found until Ryan was arrested in a post-office in Minneapolis in Decem ber, 1923, when he was shot while calling for his mail by Minneapolis police, who were in the post-office waiting for Ryan to call. With them were Deputy Warden Tucker of Kingston; and Inspector Walter Duncan, of the federal investigation Auto-Strop, Gem, Evered branch of the finance department. The Gang Quarrelled.

Ryan came back in custody, pleaded guilty to the charge of holding up and robbing the Bank of Nova Scotia and was given a life sentence and fourteen lashes by Judge Coatsworth. Later the lash penalty was remitted by Ottawa.

Simpson's Mistake.

Simpson when he escaped was serving a five-year term for shop-breaking and theft, having been sent down from Toronto on September 24, 1921. Why he attempted to escape caused much speculation among prison authorities as he had served two years and it was stated at the time he was going to be recommended for ticket of leave that Christmas.

Gordon Simpson is twenty-six years of age. He was sentenced for shopbreaking and receiving. He was a member of the gang led by Tommy Quinn, now serving a ten-year term. which broke into a number of the United Cigar Stores in Toronto and wheeled out the "baby" safes from the stores. He was also involved, it is alleged, in a number of clothing and fur robberies in Toronto, and different parts of Ontario.

Epilepsy and Crime

A DOCTOR'S DISCLOSURES.

A charge of shoplifting was recently dropped at the instance of the Public Prosecutor on the ground that the ac cused was, at the time the act was committed, suffering from "masked epilepsy" and was quite unconscious of what he was doing.

It would be difficult to say how many crimes, more especially murders, have been committed by sufferers from this mysterious complaint. An epileptic fit, even if so slight as to cause no apparent loss of consciousness, often leaves behind it a condition very much resembling sleep-walking. The patient has, in the phrase used by alienists, a "dual consciousness." He performs the automatic routine acts to which he is used, eats and sleeps, walks and talks exactly as he has always done, yet when he recovers or "awakes" can remember nothing of what has occurred since his fit.

But in this Jekyll and Hyde duality there is another partner, a madman whose diseased brain suggests delusions. Should these, as is often the Corner Water and Prescott S case, take the form of delusions of persecution, the epileptic will stop at nothing to avenge himself upon his supposed tormentor. It is such cases as this, not the raving maniacs. that provide almost all the "very dangerous" patients in asylums.

The cunning Mr. Hyde can plot and plan with diabolical ingenuity, can carry out his plan of revenge, and cover his tracks in a way few sane men could excel, without disturbing the slumbering Dr. Jekyll. And when the latter awakes at last the days or weeks of his sleep will be a sealed book to him.

It is but rarely that one hears counsel for the defence urge that his client remembers nothing whatever of his crime, but such a claim should be an essential to any acquittal on the ground of epileptic insanity.
