

THE LEGISLATURE.

We have not room for our report of the Legislative Assembly to-day. Last night the resolutions granting further aid to railways, were, after a keen debate, adopted, in committee, and they will be brought up for concurrence in the House to-day.

THE EXPERIMENTAL FARM.

Visit of the Council of the Agricultural Association to Guelph.

As will be seen by the report of the proceedings of the Council of the Agricultural Association in another column, the members, at the request of the Hon. Mr. McKellar, Commissioner of Agriculture, paid a visit to Guelph to-day for the purpose of seeing some land in the vicinity of the Town, which had been offered to the Government as a site for the Agricultural College and Experimental Farm. As will be judged from the report of the Committee, and the remarks of several members of the Council, the land purchased by the late Government for this Farm, near Mimico, is very unsuitable for the purpose. The Government, in consequence, are unwilling to proceed further in the matter until they have ascertained whether a better location cannot be got on more favorable terms, which would meet with the approbation of the Council, and of the Province at large, and would answer the purpose for which the land is intended.

In accordance with the wish of the Government, most of the members of the Council came to Guelph last night, and put up at the Royal Hotel. They are Mr. White, President; Mr. Wilson, Vice-president; Hon. David Christie, Hon. Mr. Skead, Messrs. Geo. Graham, Geo. Murton, McN. b. Diamond, Shipley, and Prof. Buckland. They were met this (Saturday) morning by Mr. David Stirling, M. P., and the Rev. W. F. Clarke, who have taken much interest in this matter, and who accompanied the deputation.

The company started in sleighs about 9 o'clock for Mr. Wm. Hood's farm, adjacent to the town, on the Speed, which we learn could be purchased at a very reasonable figure—much less in fact than was paid for the poor, swampy land at Mimico. The farm comprises 400 acres, the land is of excellent quality, well watered, and is in the best order. The buildings are good, the situation of the farm could not be excelled, and it is very convenient to the town. A better place could not be got for the purpose in the whole of Ontario. The deputation also visited Mr. F. W. Stone's well-known farm, Morton Lodge, which we believe could be purchased at a fair valuation, and which would also be admirably adapted for an Experimental Farm, as it already possesses first-class buildings, and other conveniences, for carrying on farming on an extensive scale.

The deputation returned at two o'clock. A meeting of the Council will be held this afternoon, when it will probably bring in a report on the farms visited to-day.
