BARTENDER SOLD BOOZE TO INTOXICATED MEN; HAS LICENSE SUSPENDED

License Inspector Foster Made Example of Strathcona Wine Clerk

The liquor license branch of the Attorney General's department has suspended bartender's license No. 135, held by a bar tender in one of the Strathcona hotels, for an infraction of section 72 of the Liquor License Ordinance, selling liquor to an intoxicated person. This bartender was warned about his action by an employee of the department, but would not heed the warning. Chief License Inspector Foster says, in connection with this matter, that the suspension of license of a few bartenders' licenses in different parts of the province will have the effect of making bartenders responsible for the consequences of their work under the Liquor License ordinance.

In the issuing of these licenses for the year 1912-13 to bartenders, there was printed across the face of the license, in red ink, the following caution:

"Do not serve liquor to drunken men.—under section 72 of the Liquor License Ordinance it is a crime to serve liquor to drunken men, or to allow a drunken man to consume liquor upon licensed premises. Man to man it is not right. Bartenders are cautioned to exercise care and judgment under this section of the Act, under the penalties prescribed by the Ordinance and under penalty of cancellation of license."

MAY BUILD PLANT TO MAKE TAR PAPER HERE

Local Business Men Meet With This Object in View; to Meet Again Saturday

Weight of Paper Increased 50 Per Cent. After It is Dipped; Salvage in Freight Rates

With the object of forming a company in Calgary and locating a tar paper factory in this city to supply the daily increasing demand of contractors and building supply houses, several local businessmen have already held a meeting, and this meeting is to be followed by a second meeting on Saturday next.

At the present time all the tar paper used in Calgary is brought from Winnipeg, but if the plans for the formation of the Calgary company goes through, the tar paper will be brought to this city from Hull, Quebec, and dipped in tar here. It is pointed out that the weight of a roll of paper after it is dipped in tar is 50 per cent. heavier than before the dipping process, and that the freight rate on the paper from Quebec to Calgary when it is lighter than the paper from Hull, Quebec, is a fair position to compete with the Winnipeg manufacturers, who at the present time have to bring their paper to Winnipeg from Hull, unload it from the cars, dip it and then ship it on to Calgary at another high freight rate and with additional charges tacked on for the extra handling cost.

It is estimated that at least six carloads of tar paper are used every week by Calgary builders and the demand is growing daily.

GERMAN SOCIALIST WON'T KNOW HOW TO SPEND IT

Geneva, July 27.—Emile Fischer, a poor mechanic, of Coire, has inherited \$1,300,000 from the estate of an uncle who died recently in the United States. Fischer, a German Socialist, is the treasurer of the workmen's union at Coire. His comrades and friends hope that he will employ his fortune to further the cause of Socialism in Switzerland. Fischer is at present staying in St. Gall.

PARISIAN DANCER IS FINED FOR APPEARING IN HER BABY CLOTHES

Berlin, July 27.—Mlle. Villany, the classical dancer, was condemned at Munich to pay a fine of \$75.00 or go to prison for six days, for dancing on the stage in no more elaborate toilette than that of Mother Eve. She was acquitted on the same charge a few months ago, and since then Munich has been in the throes of a controversy as to the propriety of the performances, which found its echo in the great organs of the French press.

As at the previous trial, a number of eminent painters and writers gave evidence on behalf of Mlle. Villany, and declared her performances were inspired by supreme art; that they had taken their wives and sisters to see her, and that the exhibition of the female form was elevating and spiritual. In spite of this the Crown prosecutor, who was appealing against the previous decision, obtained a verdict, which the court based on the ground that Mlle. Villany's dance might be artistic, the exhibition of the unclothed body was not.

SOCIALISTS WILL NEVER ELIMINATE INSANITY

Starling Statement Made by a Prominent German Socialist in Magazine

London, July 27.—Dr. Alfred Salter, Socialist and Labor candidate for Bermondsey, discussing "Socialism and Insanity" in a Socialist publication, makes his startling statement that "he does not think we shall ever eliminate insanity altogether, and I would add that I do not think it is socially desirable that we should."

"Is not the Socialist movement," he asks, "while eminently sane in its tendency, filled with cranks and neurotics, and half-bred 'geniuses, as well as with many men and women of real and conspicuous genius? Has not the tendency in all ages been for the neurotic to gravitate towards any new movement making for progress? And has not progress always been achieved in the end by visionaries and fanatics and neuropaths driving forward the great inert, solid, sane, and non-progressive crowd? You cannot have progress without neurosis, and you cannot have neurosis without a certain proportion of insanity."

Why? It is that the wind will blow a gust just as you are working overtime. It's always working overtime. When you have one lone match.

LIKE WARRIORS OF OLD THE POLICE WILL WEAR METAL SHIELDS

Geneva, July 27.—The Electro metalurgic society, which has its factory at Neuchatel, has received an order to construct a certain number of body shields (bucklers) for the police of Paris. These shields, the invention of a Swiss named Paul Girod, of Neuchatel, have been tested, and are said to have successfully resisted revolver shots.

USE INDIVIDUAL ROOMS FOR INCURABLE PATIENTS

Paris Hospital to Adopt Innovation Within the Near Future

Paris, July 27.—At the last meeting of the Academy of Medicine the members discussed an innovation about to be introduced in the new hospital at Lyons, which is to be the most perfect in the world, and among other improvements is to have separate rooms for patients who are in a hopeless condition. The eminent Professor Vidal, in reply to the celebrated accoucheur, M. Pinard, who deplored that not a single hospital in France possessed any accommodation of this description, protested that his own clinic in the Hospital Cochin provided patients with the last consolation of passing away in separate chambers; but he strongly objected to such rooms being called "rooms for the dying," since those who were transferred thither from the wards were immediately conscious that they would never leave them. The real need for such special rooms was rather in the interests of the other patients than of desperate cases who were generally past caring about their surroundings.

M. Le Mesurier, chief of the state hospitals, and M. Valliant agreed with Professor Vidal, and finally M. Pinard himself was forced to admit the usefulness of calling special isolated rooms by any name referring to death. The discussion terminated with a resolution that "measures should be taken so that patients should not be treated under circumstances compelling them to suffer by witnessing the spectacle of suffering and death," as is the case in wards containing forty beds in the state hospital of the Assistance Publique, where all that is done is to place a screen round the bed of the unfortunate moribund cases so that those lying beside them may not see the end coming.

INDIAN LADIES MUST WEAR SKIRTS AND THERE IS TROUBLE BREWING

Mombasa, July 27.—The town of Ingambane has been in a state of revolt owing to the decree issued by the local Portuguese governor directing that all native women must wear skirts. First, the Indian store-keepers, who kept on hand large stocks of shawls and handkerchiefs suitable to the native fashions, threatened to close their stores.

Then those women who are in the habit of flocking to the town with eggs and vegetables gave notice that they could not possibly think of continuing their visits to Inhambane under such insulting circumstances.

In addition, it was regarded as certain that thousands of natives living in and around the town would decide to leave it at once for more comfortable quarters, where skirts were fortunately regarded as superfluous.

Ultimately, so great was the volume of adverse opinion, the governor withdrew his decree.

Sir—I notice in The Morning Albertan of today's date a reported interview with Dr. Herman Paasche, vice-president of the German Reichstag, concerning the present naval expansion of Great Britain and Germany.

Dr. Paasche, according to the report, would make Canadians believe that the present rate of increase in the German naval program was made necessary through the expansion and development of the German empire, to guard their lines of communication and protect their sea-borne commerce and colonies.

It would be interesting, and startling, too, if Dr. Paasche could give the

readers of The Morning Albertan the number and disposition of war ships of all classes now doing duty on the high seas for the purpose described by him.

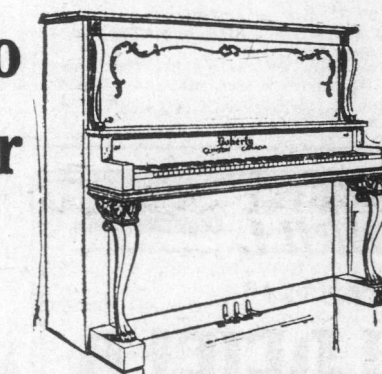
Dr. Paasche also forgets to state that these warships are almost without exception kept in the North sea, a few hours' steaming from the British coast, fully manned, with steam up and their coal bunkers charged to an extent much more than is considered necessary for the ordinary protection of commerce. No, Mr. Editor, depend upon it, the first lord of the British admiralty is no doubt alive to the true situation.
