High Cost of Living Renders Increases Necessary; Calgary Member Criticized

The new union government is not going o be neglectful of the needs of soldiers and their dependents if the Great War Next-of-Kin association can prevent it At a meeting of the association last night The Great War Veterans will hold their monthly meeting Sunday at 3 o'clock in the Empress theater. The names of a number of new members will be submitted and reports of committees considered.

The Great War Veterans will hold their ration allowances be increased, dating from April 17, 1917, to keep pace with the steadily increasing cost of living. The resolution also expressed appreciation of the increase granted to widows and soldiers, but asked that the government take steps to prevent outside. a resolution was passed asking that sepadiers, but asked that the government take steps to prevent eviction of soldiers fami-lies by landlords during the continuance of the war or provide suitable accommodation. This was brought up by from the Lethbridge branch, which found cases of soldiers families being obliged to move through greatly increased rents or having houses sold. It was also decided having houses sold. It was also decided that the petition dealing with equal pensions; fixing of prices of necessities of life, taxing of war profits, etc., which had already been sent to Tremier Borden, be resent to the new cabinet. The insufficient money being paid the families of British reservists and also of soldiers of other ailied nations, resident in the west, was the foregain and the federal came up for discussion and the federa ple be put on an equal basis with Cana-dian soldiers' dependents, as great privation and suffering was resulting from the meagre pay allowed these soldiers. Patriotic Grants Not Coming

The promised increase in the patriotic fund grants, which had been promised August 1st, have not been received, except a few isolated cases, by any dependents n a few isolated cases, by any depotents in southern Alberta, according to reports.
