The announcement has raised the ire of the general alumni in a strong protest. The action of the board in such a radical revision of the faculty will rebound to the detriment of Howard. The members affected have contributed in no small degree to the high standing the school attained and placed it on a par with many of the reading institutions of learning in the country.
