TO THE Independent Freeholders OF THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX.

Your reception of my circular letter of the 25th ultimo, and personal interview with a great portion of you during my recent tour, by convincing me of your determination to assert and maintain your constitutional rights and privileges, has excited the warmest feeling of my esteem and respect, so as to insure to you my confidence and regard, and the expression of my grateful thanks.

My principles being defined by positive rules which are strictly regulated by the liberal spirit of the constitution, within such limits and improvements as are consistent with the true interests of a good government, are responded to by every man of sound sense and patriotic sentiment, with a cordiality of feeling and unity of purpose which I can venture to assert must and will undoubtedly triumph over all opposition.

I would therefore most earnestly recommend to my brother freeholders, to avoid the stigma of being regarded as factious revolutionists on the one hand, or of the mercenary time serving passive instruments of corrupt and unworthy use of power, tending to undermine and destroy the true character of that authority which they would vainly use to impose upon your understandings—that place and power were only meant to be enjoyed by a chosen few, and that honest independence was to be branded with a character of opprobrium and disgrace—but trust me, I know the country better, and that a feeling of cool reflecting determination at this moment exists amongst the Freeholders of Middlesex, which will not fail to exhibit its loyalty and attachment to our SOVEREIGN, and prove it by supporting useful institutions, but reserving the right of the people to correct and amend all the visible imperfections of the law, to economise the public issues in every department, and generally to appropriate every available fund to improve the condition and resources of the colony in every respect.

But remember, brother Freeholders, to do this we must be active, energetic, and united. And I conclude, by assuring you, that I mean the words used in my circular, of "moderate, rational, and constitutional Reform," to extend to the correction of every abuse now existing in the representation, and to the most effective advocacy of the rights of the people.

I have still to regret my inability to obtain a list of the Freeholders from any official source, to enable me to wait upon you personally, and must claim your indulgence for the omission.
