BOTH DROWNED. Middletown, Feb. 11.-Peter L. Atkins, proprietor of a wagon repair shop in this city, took Maud Kelley out driving Sunday night. About 11 o'clock they crossed Walkill River at Hopkins' Bridge, and in the darkness Atkins drove off the road into the flooded meadow. The water was nine feet deep, and the two stood on the seat of the wagon calling for help. A Frenchman named Beaupre went to their assistance with a lantern, but when the water reached his hips he was obliged to retire.
