MASKED ROBBERS

Wreck a Maryland Postoffice—Lively Fight With Tramps.

Frederick, Md., April 12.—Three masked robbers blew open the safe in the postoffice at Mount Airy with dynamite last night and secured \$500 in stamps and \$350 cash. The building was wrecked by the explosion. Charles Riddlemeyer, a telegraph operator, was attracted by the explosion. He was covered with a pistol, and the robbers compelled him to stand with uplifted hands until they made their escape. 25c

Hebron, N. D., April 12.—After a lively fight, in which numerous shots were fired, six tramps, trying to hold up a freight train here, were arrested and lodged in jail. They shot at the conductor and terrorized the train crew, but were rounded up by a posse of citizens with rifles. One of the tramps will lose a leg. 25c

THE RAILS SPREAD.

Bellefonte, Pa., April 12.—An accident occurred this afternoon on one of the mine sidings of the Bellefonte and Snowshoe Railroad, three miles east of Snowshoe, by which three men were instantly killed and one injured. One of the mountain shifting engines was returning empty from the Hole mines to the main line at Snowshoe. When within three miles of the latter place the rails spread and the engine and a dozen cars were thrown over the embankment. 25c

Whisperings of An Early Advance

Lord Roberts Employing His Great Army Effectively.

Adventurous Boer Commandos Likely To Be Enmeshed—Colonials at Wepener Still Hold Off the Boers—The Kick Against Portugal May End in Britain's Landing Troops

at Lorenzo Marquez—Roberts Has a Force of 214,000 Effective Men, With 12,000 More Coming—Col. Drury's Column of Canadians and Australians Reach Brits-

town, Cape Colony.

London, April 13—4:05 a.m.—In a roundabout way, London hears that Lord Roberts, when writing to the Prince of Wales at Copenhagen congratulating him on his escape from assassination, added two or three hopeful sentences portending an early advance, with wide-reaching combinations.

Quiet assurances are passed around among military men that Lord Roberts is employing his great army effectively and that the adventurous Boer commandos are

LIKELY TO BE ENMESHED.

Scrap of news—a detail here and another there—have reached England tonight over comparatively idle cables, but they do not illuminate the situation.

The colonials at Wepener still hold off the Boers.

Lord Methuen has worked eastward until he is within 80 miles of Kroonstad.

Boer scouts have gone around Ladysmith and have appeared at Dewdrop and other places on Gen. Buller's flanks and rear. The officers of Buller's irregular horse estimate the Boers in Natal at 35,000, but these figures are probably excessive, 10,000 being regarded here as the outside number.

BULLER'S BIG FORCE.

After Gen. Hart's brigade leaves him, Gen. Buller will have close upon 35,000 men. It is generally assumed that this brigade is going to join Lord Roberts, but its destination is really unknown.

The Boer note to Portugal regarding the use by the Boers of the Beira route for the transportation of troops to Rhodesia, may, if the Boers act against Portugal, lead Great Britain to

LAND TROOPS AT LORENZO MARQUEZ.

The work of the Boer peace commissioners has begun. Mr. Fischer has asked Italy to intervene, and the Italian minister of foreign affairs has replied that while he would receive the envoys, the best he could do would be to transmit their proposals to London, thus following the course of the United States.

"NEVER AGAIN."

Sir Alfred Milner, when replying to a deputation of clergymen in Cape Town yesterday, said "Never Again" must be the motto of all thinking and humane men; but not from lust of conquest, or a desire to trample on the gallant if misguided. There must be no compromise or patchwork in the settlement, and no opportunity for misunderstanding, intrigue, the revival of impossible ambitions or the accumulation of enormous armaments. The British will no longer tolerate a dissimilar and antagonistic political system in a country which nature and history have declared to be one. In these absolute utterances of Sir Alfred Milner, he speaks for the imperial government.

214,000 EFFECTIVE TROOPS.

It is calculated that Lord Roberts now has 214,000 effective troops, with 12,000 more about, or under orders. The war office has instructed officers not to take any more expanding bullets to Africa for revolvers.

STEYN'S BROTHER EXPLAINS.

Mr. Hildyard Steyn, brother of President Steyn, in the course of an interview at Bloemfontein, said: "The original war plan of the Boers was to overrun all Cape Colony, but on becoming involved in the sieges of Kimberley and Ladysmith, the burghers found the design spoiled. To this I attribute the Boer failure to conquer the British. I expect the war to last until Christmas."

The seventh month of the war is beginning with Easteride, and the morning paper editorials expatiate upon the need of soberness.

BOER MOVEMENTS.

London, April 13.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Lorenzo Marquez, dated Thursday, says: "It is reported from Pretoria that a Boer commando is moving through Basutoland. This is said to be a clever ruse to draw the British away from Wepener."

About 2,000 foreigners constitute the new Foreign Legion in Pretoria, including some Cossacks in uniform.

Several fresh recruits left here for Pretoria today, including a French captain, brother of the late Gen. De Ville
