The rescuers were unable to penetrate further into the mines, as it was necessary to make another opening to permit fresh air to reach the lower levels. Horses and scrapers were put at work hauling debris away from the shaft. Th work is progressing slowly, owing to the narrow space in which the rescuers are compelled to operate. Late Tuesday night a party of rescuers reached four mules that were alive, and this caused renewed hope. It is a faint hope, however, for experienced mine bosses and miners say
