

FOOTBALL TEAM IN BAD WRECK

Players of Purdue College
Killed On Big Four Road.

SIXTEEN BODIES RECOVERED

Thirty-Three Passengers Seriously
Injured—How the Accident
Occurred.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 2.—Following is the list of dead in the Big Four railway accident: Charles Grube, of Butler, Indiana, substitute; Charles Furr, Veedsburg, Ind., guard; E. C. Howard, Lafayette, Ind.; Bert Price, Spencer, Ind., substitute; J. C. Coats, Berwin, Pa.

WRECKAGE CAUGHT FIRE

To add to the horror the wreckage caught fire, but the flames were extinguished by the students after a hard fight. There were many miraculous escapes and thrilling experiences. The injured are in at least twenty cases in very serious condition. A dozen or more have broken bones, and in several cases there are compound fractures of two limbs, and the death list is expected to grow to at least twenty.

While the work of rescue was going on there arrived in the city over twenty cheering followers of Indiana University at Bloomington. News of the wreck turned all to sympathy, and many went to the scene of the disaster to render aid.

The special train bore the Lafayette rosters, numbering nearly 1,000. It consisted of twelve coaches and was running at the first station at about 10:30. At a gravel pit switch near Eighteenth street, a switch engine with a cut of coal cars, collided with the passenger. The passenger engine and the first three coaches were almost totally destroyed. The first coach was crushed and splintered, the second telescoped and thrown down an embankment fifteen feet high, while the third coach was thrown across the track. There is confusion as to what caused the accident, each engineer insisting that he had the track and did not know of the other train. A committee of inquiry is being organized, and a full investigation is being made. The crash of the two trains threw the coal cars through the first two coaches, in which were many of the players and substitutes. The engine, two coal cars and two coaches were crushed into a confused mass of wreckage. Under this pile of debris were fifty or more students of the university.

The dead were carried away as fast as they could be taken from the wreck. The last bodies taken were those of W. M. Grube, of Butler, Ind., and Walter Furr, of Corpus Christi, Tex. Their mangled bodies were carried under the overturned tender, crushed almost beyond recognition. The work of rescuing these bodies required the combined work of the wrecking crew and many of the city firemen and policemen. The tender was buried with jacks, and the bodies were drawn out. The body of Gabriel S. Drollinger was found almost beheaded under the wreckage of the first coach. It was rescued with difficulty, owing to the danger of the debris falling over.

GIRL RESCUERS

The scenes following the rescue of the dead and injured were distressing. Strong men wept and cried when they looked upon the faces of their dead playmates or at the suffering of their classmates and fraternity brothers. Here and there someone would stoop and lift from the face of one of the dead a handkerchief or piece of garment that had been placed over the features by a friend. Many of the girls rolled their sleeves and knelt by the side of the stricken men and bathed their wounds until the services of a surgeon could be secured. All the young men killed were in the first coach. They were found lying tangled and bleeding with their limbs pinned against the sides. The coach held about seventy persons. Several of the suffering fellows pitifully pleaded that their names be not published, because of the anguish it would cause their mothers and fathers.

Three miles away twelve hundred cheering students arrived on a special train from Bloomington, Ind., with the Indiana University eleven eager for the contest on the gridiron. They poured out of the train with band playing and colors flying, to be met with the news of the tragedy to their rivals from Purdue. Instantly the bands played, colors lowered and hidden beneath coats. Tears followed laughter, and college yells faded into mournful expressions of sincere, heartfelt sympathy. The proposed game has been indefinitely postponed.

CHAMPION INJURED

World's Greatest Motorist in Smash-Up at Brighton.

New York, Nov. 2.—Hurled from a racing motor car going at something approaching approximately a mile a minute, Albert Champion, the world's champion motor cyclist, was seriously injured at the second annual speed meeting of the Long Island Automobile Club at the Brighton Beach race track. The accident occurred in the first mile of pursuit race. The wheels skidded and the car swerved and plunged through the fence on the inside of the track. Champion was thrown 20 feet. When assistance reached him he was unconscious. His right arm was lacerated and almost torn from its socket. His head was cut and his right leg broken near the thigh by what appeared to be a compound fracture.

STRANGELY ACTING FACE

A Peculiar Case Decided by Philadelphia Jury.

Philadelphia, Nov. 2.—Twelve jurors unanimously decided Saturday in the criminal court that a man's face had deliberately bumped itself against another's fist.

Rhodes Shee, a brick manufacturer, is the owner of the strangely-acting face, and the possessor of the fist in the case is one Thomas F. Gegan.

Shee, who had made a charge of assault and battery against Gegan, swore that the latter had visited him in his office and, after an argument over a contract, had struck him in the face.

Gegan told a story which made the jurymen laugh, and they decided that it was true.

"It was this way," he said. "Shee declared I was no good morally, mentally and physically, and in the excitement of the moment I raised my fist and held my arm out straight in front of me. And would you believe it? The first thing I knew Shee moved right forward and struck my face against it. It was the strangest thing I've ever seen."

Shee thought the same thing about the verdict.

MANUFACTURERS INDORSE POLICY

Canadian Association Approve
of Toronto Resolution
Sent Chamberlain.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—In an interview with Mr. W. K. McNaught, chairman of the tariff committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, it was learned that the manufacturers are heartily in accord with the resolution passed at the board of trade meeting Friday night, supporting Mr. Chamberlain's policy, though they did not agree with certain reasons given in favor of it by some of the speakers.

Mr. McNaught said: "One speaker proposed free trade within the empire; another a uniform tariff within the empire. Both propositions are out of the question, for whatever happens Canada must retain control of her own tariff, and any tariff arrangement between Great Britain and Canada must be in the nature of a bargain."

"The resolution passed Friday night is, however, along the lines of those of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and will greatly strengthen Mr. Chamberlain's hands at this time. I believe Mr. Chamberlain was misunderstood in the cables containing his reference to 'secondary industries.' I have definite information that it was not his intention that Canada should be hindered from developing whatever industries could be operated in this country with a fair prospect of success. His policy, I think, agrees with ours, which is that Canada's first duty is to herself, and afterwards to the empire. We can help Great Britain greatly by raising the tariff against foreign countries, and thus permit Great Britain to secure a larger portion of the trade now done by those countries. It is entirely a matter of adjustment, and I believe a tariff as high as that proposed by Mr. Chamberlain can be arranged which will be of great advantage to both countries, and no material advantage to either."

A DISCIPLE OF TOLSTOI

To Seek Election to British House of Commons.

London, Nov. 2.—Stewart Gray, a disciple of Tolstoi, independent candidate for Parliament from Tunbridge, has become the most picturesque figure in the political campaign in England. Gray practices Tolstoi's preachings. In the first meeting in the town hall of Tunbridge Wells he wore a potato sack instead of an overcoat. Gray dispensed with the usual formalities of selecting a chairman to preside over the meeting and placed a British flag in the chair. Gray's political platform is "The Land for the People." He advises the adoption of the obstructive tactics of the Irish parliamentarians in order to compel Premier Balfour to resign.

Gray is educated and well to do. He lives in the manner advocated by Tolstoi and earns his daily bread as a farm laborer. He lives in an abandoned hut near Tunbridge Wells. After his day's work on the farm, he spends the evening lecturing and procuring converts. The hut he inhabits contains nothing but a wash stand, a cot and a bookcase. Gray declares he needs only enough to obtain food for himself and share with the waifs whom he always befriends. His mission in life is to better the welfare of the "People." He has devoted himself to the defense of the land by unjust laws. Gray does not anticipate election.

RUSSIAN TROOPS SEIZE MUKDEN

Chinese Treaty Port in Possession of 1,000 Soldiers.

CHINA APPEALS TO POWERS

For Advice as to How to Act—Significant Movement of Viceroy Alexieff.

Peking, Nov. 2.—The Japanese Consul at New Chwang reports that the Russians have reoccupied Mukden with 500 soldiers. This apparently confirms a previous report from St. Petersburg. The Chinese Government is greatly disturbed at the reoccupation of Mukden, the capital of Manchuria, by Russian troops. The foreign office is appealing to friendly foreign legations for help and advice, admitting its own helplessness in the matter. According to advice received by the Chinese Government, 1,100 Russian soldiers took possession of the official buildings, barricaded the gates and evicted the Chinese officials. There are between ten and twenty thousand Chinese troops in the vicinity of Mukden, but the Chinese commanders in Manchuria have been given imperative orders in no wise to resist the Russian troops. The Russians employed a noted brigand, who was accused of many crimes against the Chinese, as chief of one of the irregular bands of police they are organizing in Manchuria. The Chinese authorities repeatedly requested the surrender of this man, and the Russians recently consented to give him up. Thereupon a Chinese officer decapitated the brigand without giving him a trial. When this became known the Russians demanded the execution of this officer within five days, giving as an alternative the seizure of Mukden. The Chinese foreign office, questioned by Paul Lessar, the Russian minister, on the matter, and refused to banish the officer in question, advising that he had exceeded his instructions, and to remove the total, his superior, from office. There was a misunderstanding as to the time limit set for these negotiations; the Chinese thought it expired yesterday. Before the negotiations were completed the news was received that Russia had fulfilled her threat to reoccupy Mukden.

The fact that Viceroy Alexieff has removed his headquarters from Peking to Vladivostok has caused great surprise in Peking. It is generally conjectured that he was unwilling to risk passing the winter at a port which the Japanese undoubtedly would make a strenuous attempt to blockade in the event of war, thereby preventing the viceroy from communicating with his government.

HAS LORD "BOBS" RESIGNED OFFICE?

Rumor Says He Has Decided to
Retire From Active
Service.

London, Nov. 2.—There is a report in the military clubs that Lord Roberts has tendered his resignation as commander-in-chief of the British army. Lord Roberts had an interview with the King during the week and it is supposed he discussed his resignation with his majesty. The resignation of affairs of the war office. Lord Roberts is not unwilling to resign, for it is said he realizes he is too old to undertake the task of introducing and administering the many reforms proposed in the war office. Lord Roberts after his retirement will visit the United States.

EDWARD THE EDITOR

His Majesty Corrects Proofs of Book of Travel.

London, Nov. 2.—King Edward is nothing if not versatile, and his latest role is that of an editor. For probably the first time in his life he has read and corrected the proofs of a book. It gives a history of his majesty's recent visit to Portugal, Malta, Italy and France, the story of the royal tour having been written by the Hon. Charles Harding, who accompanied the King as minister plenipotentiary. The book will constitute a valuable piece of contemporary history, as it will contain official accounts of the meetings between King Edward and the Kings of Italy and Portugal and the President of the French Republic.

Pictorially it will be an interesting souvenir of his majesty's tour. Snapshots of the King and his hosts have been beautifully reproduced by the colotype process, and in addition there are other photographs in ordinary half-tone and four original drawings by the Chevalier de Martino, the King's marine painter, who accompanied him on the tour. A limited edition of this important work is to be placed upon the market, and sumptuously bound copies are to be presented to the King and Queen, Princess Victoria and the Prince of Wales, while a number of copies will be placed at the King's disposal, and will probably be sent as souvenirs to his friends, including the Kings of Italy and Portugal and President Loubet.

As an editor the King exercised great care: material changes were made in that part of the book dealing with the visit to Italy, his majesty striking out certain features which did not appear to him to be necessary.

THE NEW YORK ELECTIONS

McLellan Is Favorite in the Big Fight for Mayor.

New York, Nov. 2.—The most remarkable campaign in the history of the city practically came to a close tonight, with both the Democrats and Fusionists claiming the victory. There will be closing rallies Monday night and some meetings in the theaters tonight, but the lines now are drawn and it is all over but the voting. The practical politician on both sides will devote their time from now until Tuesday night to getting their voters to the polls and strengthening up weak places in their lines.

While both sides are claiming victory, to an impartial observer the chances of McLellan seem to be the best. The whole tenor of the Democratic campaign has been to draw party lines and to impress upon the voters the importance of a Democratic victory in New York on the eve of a presidential election. In what measure they have succeeded in this will develop when the voters are counted Tuesday night. The impression prevails outside of partisan circles that the party cry has been sufficiently effective to carry McLellan in by a safe margin.

U. S. WILL TRY TO ENFORCE TREATY

The Republic Preparing to Take
a Firm Stand With
Russia.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 2.—The simple order that the collier Pompey will proceed from Manila to Niu Chwang reveals the fact that the United States Government has taken initial steps to enforce the treaty with Russia that there shall be two open ports in Manchuria for the United States. Since the treaty was made for these open ports the state department has been endeavoring to secure the ability that Russia would not keep its word and the administration has been trying to devise some plans to hold the government of the czar to its contract.

The fact that a collier was ordered to that point exacts comment at the state department today and investigation showed that she would be followed by the collier Helena, which vessel would go to Mukden for the winter, she being of light draft and able to navigate the stream to that point. The Pompey will unload coal at a point convenient for the Helena when she goes into winter quarters. The collier Helena is on the scene as the representative of this government should Russia attempt to back out of her obligations after the treaty has been ratified by the United States senate.

The presence of the Helena in Russian territory is looked upon by certain officials as likely to cause some feeling with the troops of the czar and there is a possibility of a repetition of the incident which occurred at the jacks of this country and Russian troops which occurred several years ago when the gunboat Vicksburg was in Chinese waters.

ELECTRICITY RAMPANT

Ties Up Telegraph in England, Italy and Maine.

London, Nov. 2.—The most severe electrical storm of many years crippled telegraphic communication throughout the United Kingdom Saturday. The storm shows no sign of abating. Telegraphic communication between France and the remainder of Europe and America was almost suspended throughout the entire day in consequence of an electrical disturbance which seemed to be general. It is attributed to seismic movements and atmospheric phenomena, regarding which nothing definite is ascertainable.
