ceived a thumping majority. Instead, a Conservative majority of 449 has changed into 1,389 Liberal.

A rumor has been current that Sir Gilbert Parker was asked to give Gravesend to Balfour. He was credited with replying that Gravesend was won on a platform of advanced tariff reform and could not be carried on retaliation.

It is understood that nothing will be done regarding a seat for the leader until after the house meets, but rumor persists that he will go to the House of Lords.

Liberals elected on Saturday were: Carnarvon Wells, Lloyd George, 1,124; Flint, Idris, 376; Prestwick, Cawley, 4,163; Rosendale, Harcourt, 2,219; Pudsey, Whiteley, 3,502; Sowerby, Higham, 2,448; Spebvalley Whittaker, 2,564.

Conservatives elected were St. Andrew's burghs Gray, 23, a gain; Ayrd (polled Friday), Younger, 261, a gain. Returns from thirteen other ridings have not yet been received.

London, Jan. 21.—"I am not downhearted," said Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, in an appeal to Shropshire electors on Saturday. "I am not one of those who dread to be in the minority."

"We who will be returned to present the greatest ideas of the Empire reform may be sometimes small, but I believe we will be a united band."

"The fewer we are the more essential it should be that we be united in policy."

"We are determined in our action that our true cause shall have representation."

Mr. Chamberlain expressed the opinion that the Liberals with their great majority and their Labor allies would not be a happy family long.

EIGHTEEN WORSHIPERS PERISH THROUGH PANIC IN A CHURCH

Cry of "Fire" Stampedes Colored Congregation and Many Are Tramped to Death in Wild Rush.

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 21.—Eighteen persons were killed and probably half a hundred injured in a panic following the cry of "fire" tonight in St. Paul's Colored Baptist Church on the west side of Eighth street, between Poplar street and Girard avenue.

The services were being held on the second floor of the building. A defective flue set fire to the chimney, causing smoke to issue through the crevices in the floor near the pulpit.

The room was well filled with people at the time, and the cry of fire, coupled with the sight of the smoke, threw the congregation into a panic. A wild rush was made for the stairs, despite the efforts of the pastor.

All wanted to get out at once, and men, women and children were knocked down and trampled upon by those pushing from behind. The stair-

way to the first floor had one sharp turn in it, and the frightened people became so tightly wedged in the bend of the stairs that the frail wooden bannister gave way precipitating many to the first floor.

The crash and the screams and shrieks of the women and children added to the frenzy of those above. They did not stop in their onward rush to get out. Notwithstanding the wide-open doors on the first floor leading to the street, the crush was so great that 18 persons had the life stamped out of them before the panic was ended.

A general alarm was sent in for ambulances, firemen and policemen. In the meantime the greatest confusion reigned. Men and women ran about the streets calling for missing relatives or friends.

The fire was only trifling, the flames being extinguished before the firemen arrived.

Asquith Says That All the Difficulties Will Be Successfully Met.

London, Jan. 21.—That it is the intention of the Government to give the Transvaal responsible government like Canada was announced by Henry H. Asquith in his speech on Saturday night.

The report has been current that it was to be done at the coming session, and now the minister's words give credence to the report.

Mr. Asquith said that he was speaking for all his colleagues as well as for himself in expressing the earnest desire and intention that the Transvaal and Orange River colonies should
