2,000,000 GALLONS OF SPRING WATER \$90,700 ARTESIAN SCHEME GOES TO COMMISSIONERS

A Committee of Citizens Hear Particulars and Indorse Project

100 LBS, PRESSURE IS GUARANTEED

Cost of Pumping Is Away Down -Experts Put the Seal of Approval on Wells.

At the conference held last evening in the board of trade rooms with the members of the committee who backed Hon, Adam Beck in he well scheme last January, Mr. Beck outlined his scheme in detail, and offered to supply the city with fifteen wells of a total capacity of 2,000,000 gallons, capable of being forced to 3,000,000 gallons, of the best water, with pumping plant of 4,500,000 capacity, and a reservoir of half a million capacity, for \$90,700.

If a reservoir of 1,000,000 capacity is desired the cost will be \$98,700. The members of the committee present were unanimous in favor of asking Mr. Beck to submit the proposition to the water commissioners, and a sub-committee composed of Mr. Thomas Baker, Mr. F. E. Leonard, Mr. R. J. Young, and Mr. Geo. G. McCormick, were named to interview the commissioners and endeavor to arrange a meeting today to discuss the plan with the commissioners.

Experts Here.

Mr. Beck was accompanied by Mr. H. J. Glaubitz, who has been consulting engineer with him in this enterprise; Mr. John Oliphant, of Indianapolis, one of the best known water experts in America, and Mr. W. Carter,

another expert. Complete plans and tenders for the plant, were shown the committee, and they were unanimous in stating that the whole plant could installed for the money set forth in

In addition, the cost of pumping the wells was given. Mr. Glaubitz, in his report, stated that the water could be delivered into the mains for 3.9 cents per 1,000 gallons, if 1,500,000 gallons daily were used, or 2.7 cents per 1000 gallons, if there were 3,000,000 gallons used in 24 hours.
