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SENATE REGULARS
RALLY FORCES
Aldrich Sends Out a Frantic Appeal to Save Taft Policies.

Washington, May 4.—Through the formation today of an organization, which its leaders assert, represents a clear majority of the entire Senate, and to be made up wholly of Republicans of the "regular" wing, a movement was started with intent to settle the question whether the Senate shall remain conservative, become radical, or be thrown into political chaos so far as concerns any coherent policy in regard to the administration's legislative programme.
Senator Aldrich called the "regular" Republican senators together and confronted them with a grim description of the possible political effect of their apparent defeat at the hands of the insurgent Republicans and Democrats in their fight over the traffic agreement section of the Administration railroad bill.
He asked his associates whether they were ready to submit to domination by such a combination. Any such surrender, he warned them, meant the failure of the Taft policies and the downfall of conservatism, not only in Congress, but in the Republican party generally.
Some one reminded Mr. Aldrich that senators then and there gathered together were agreed on all points. Whereupon he replied that they must get together and agree to stand together and let the details be secondary. Otherwise, he said, Congress would adjourn without a single item of the Taft programme accomplished.

DEATH OF MRS. DAMPIER
Strathroy Loses One of Its Oldest and Most Esteemed Residents.
The death occurred in Strathroy yesterday of Mrs. Sarah Dampier, relict of the late John Dampier. Mrs. Dampier was in her 83rd year, and was one of Strathroy's oldest and most highly-esteemed residents. Her son, Mr. L. H. Dampier, is manager of the Merchants Bank in Strathroy.

BORDEN TO STUMP THE PROVINCES
Ottawa, May 4.—It is understood that Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Borden will leave shortly for Nova Scotia, and after a brief rest from his labors of the session, Mr. Borden will address a series of meetings in the Maritime Provinces. Subsequently the leader of the Opposition will make a tour of Quebec and Ontario.

PITCHED BATTLES
Serious Clash Between Strikers and Police at Rhode Island.
Providence, R. I., May 3.—Angered by the refusal of the building trades to support them in their fight for higher wages, the striking building laborers yesterday visited half a dozen places where big contracts were under way, drove workmen of all trades off their jobs, and fought pitched battles with the police and strike-breakers. Several men were laid low with knives, bricks and other missiles.
Wm. Andrews, superintendent of construction for the J. W. Bishop company, which is erecting a big mill at Greystone, sent a request to Governor Pothier, asking that Rhode Island National Guard be ordered out to protect the property.

The Italian strikers, thoroughly frightened several hundred men employed on various jobs in the city, as well as at Greystone, which is just over the Rhode Island line. As a result of the several outbreaks of rioting, 26 strikers, including Felix d'Allesandro, of Boston, the organizer and leader, were arrested after more or less serious battles with the police.

TO HECKLE HEARST
The Independence League Wants To Know Where He Stands.
New York, N. Y., May 4.—If W. R. Hearst attends the meeting of the county executive committee of the Independence League at the Hotel Astor tomorrow night, to which he has been invited, it is probable—according to some of the more radical leaders—that he will be asked to make clear just where he stands in relation to the party. The meeting will be the first one of the executive committee held since last December, and a great deal of water has gone over the political dam since then.

It was the gossip of today that the radical members of the committee have it in mind that Mr. Hearst should be heckled. It was said that he will be asked to speak on or around whether he intends to stick with the league or go back to the Democratic party, and also whether he intends to be a candidate for governor in the fall.

There may be other questions, but these are said to be the main points on which some of the Independence League men wish to be officially informed.
The state committee of the league has been invited to attend the meeting. It could not be learned today if the invitation had been accepted.

A TRAGIC INCIDENT.
Montreal, May 4.—A tragic incident took place during the voyage of the Allan liner Ionia from Glasgow to Montreal. Two young people, bound for the west, George Rose and Agnes Brown, became acquainted at the start of the trip, and became engaged, intending to get married on their arrival in Canada. In mid-ocean the girl died suddenly of heart failure and her body was buried at sea. The grief of the intended husband was pathetic.

SUING A. J. SMALL.
Hamilton, May 4.—An order has been secured by counsel for Miss Jeanette Lewis, enabling them to make substantial service in the case of the writ that was issued by her against A. J. Small for damages. The bailiff in Toronto was unable to find Mr. Small, and this order was obtained so that any adult person in his house might be served. Miss Lewis is suing for damages for the cancellation of Mark Hambourg's concert in February.

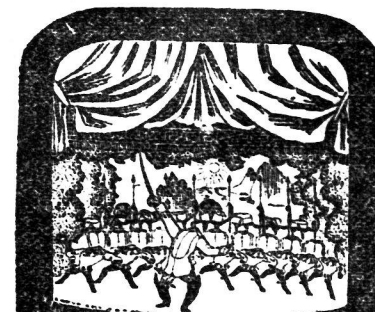
