SENATE REGULARS RALLY FORCES

Aldrich Sends Out a Frantic Appeal to Save Tait Policies.

Washington, May 4.-Through the formation today of an organization, which its leaders assert, represents a clear majority of the entire Senate, and to be made up wholly of Republicans of the "regular" wing, a movement was started with intent to setle the question whether the Senate shall remain conservative, become radical, or be thrown into political chaos so far as concerns any coherent policy in regard to the administration's legislative programme.

Senator Aldrich called the "regular" Republican senators together and confronted them with a grim description of the possible political effect of their apparent defeat at the hands of the nsurgent Republicans and Democrats in their fight over the traffic agreement section railroad bill. of the Administration He asked his associates whether

they were ready to submit to domination by such a combination. Any such surrender, he warned them, meant the failure of the Taft policies and the downfall of conservative control, not only in Congress, but in the Republican party generally.
Some one reminded Mr. Aldrich

that senators then and there gathered ogether were not in agreement on all points. Whereupon he replied that they must get together and agree to stand together and let the details be secondary. Otherwise, he said, Congress would adjourn without a single item of the Taft programme accomplished.


