BIG SECTION ASKS TO ENTER CITY

The People of London Township South of Trafalgar Street, Would Like School Accommodations.

WOULDBOOSTPOPULATION

City Would Gain Between Two and Three Hundred People-A Conference Will Be Held Shortly With the Council.

That section of London Township, south of Trafalgar street, and from Adelaide street to Egerton, may be annexed to the city in the near future. There are about 45 houses erected, or in the course of erection, in this section, and the majority of the ratepayers are desirous of joining the city. They want a school. At the present time the school where the children attend is a very considerable distance from the residences, and many find it impossible to send their youngsters to The Chesley avenue school is but

198,906 few blocks away, and as there is 49,600 plenty of room there, the children would find no difficulty in being accommodated.
