Bridge Swept Away By Flood Just Before Train Was Due.

## WRECK ON ROCK ISLAND

Sixteen Perish in Accident Near the Town of Clayton, Kansas.

Clayton, Kan., Sept. 23.-Sixteen known to be dead, probably others killed and their bodies washed away, and eleven injured, is the result of a terrible railroad wreck which occurred on the Rock Island, two miles east of this place at an early hour Friday morning, when a fast train on the Rock Island ran through an open bridge into 20 feet of raging water. Nine of the dead have been identified, while seven are still unknown, Yes others may have been washed away by the torrent.

The stream which wrought the destruction is at ordinary times simply a dry aroya with no water, but with its bed thirty feet below the level of the railroad bridge. Early last night a tremendous rain fell, and the dry bed was soon filled to the brim with a wild torrent. The bridge itself was quickly broken up and car-

ried away. Shortly after 1 o'clock this morning, while the storm raged, the fast passenger train from Kansas City to Denver, travelling at 40 miles an hour, rushed headlong into the gap and the forward end of the train took the plunge into the water-filled ra-


