THE DARROW TRIAL

San Francisco Labor Leaders May Not Be Called as Witnesses.

[Canadian Press.] Los Angeles, July 22.—Neither Anton Johansson nor Olaf A. Tveitmo, the San Francisco labor leaders, will be called to the stand by the defence in the bribery trial of Clarence S. Darrow.

Both men had been summoned by the defence, and it had been expected that Tveitmo at least would be called to testify concerning the check for \$10,000 he was alleged to have cashed in a San Francisco bank last September.

The check had been endorsed by Mr. Darrow, and it had been the contention of the prosecution that the check had been used by the McNamara defence for corrupting jurors and witnesses.

Members of the defence declined to say whether there was any connection between the determination not to have Tveitmo testify, and the refusal of Judge Hutton several days ago to allow the defence a copy of Tveitmo's testimony before the February grand jury.

At that time Tveitmo is said to have admitted receiving and cashing the check, but he is said to have testified that the money was given him by Mr. Darrow for the purpose of paying certain expenses of the McNamara defence in San Francisco. Attorney Leconte Davis, formerly of the McNamara defence, is expected to take the stand when the trial is resumed tomorrow morning.

LID IS ON NEW YORK

Investigation Into Rosenthal Murder Has Cleaned Out Crooks.

[Canadian Press.] New York, July 22.—The investigation into the murder of Herman Rosenthal has given New York such a scouring and cleansing of crooks and gamblers as the city has not known for years. Insiders declare that for once the city is really closed tight, the new order of things extending even to the poker rooms with "club" charters, which have never feared the police.

GANGSTERS HIRED TO KILL GAMBLER

New York Authorities Expect to Arrest Today Slayer of Rosenthal.

USED "THIRD DEGREE"

Under Pressure Gang Leader Makes Important Admission to the Police.

[Canadian Press.] New York, July 22.—The Rosenthal case nears its solution. That is the belief of Deputy Police Commissioner Dougherty, who expects today to arrest two or three gun men and gangsters, who were hired to shoot and kill Herman Rosenthal before the gambler could disclose more secrets of the connection between the gambler and the police.

Grilled by a fierce third degree, Jack Sullivan, a former newsboy, held as a material witness, and Sam Paul, the East Side gang leader, suddenly made statements early today from which the police commissioner expected to get evidence. These two men, Sullivan and Paul, were taken into custody last night along with "Bridge" Weber, the gambler.

Grilled by a learned enough of the case to admit that the gunmen were gathered together on Monday night at Weber's poker rooms, where the final arrangements for the killing of Rosenthal were perfected.

Webster denies all knowledge of the shooting.

Plans to kill Rosenthal were laid on the excursion trip of the Sam Paul Association. Rosenthal had been talking too much. Some well-known gunmen and blackjacks were along on that excursion.

It was the next day that Rosenthal threatened to tell more about how the police grafted on the gambler and gambling houses that the word was passed around that Rosenthal must be made away with.

Police Commissioner Dougherty has found out that "Big Jack" Ross was a very busy man that day. He was Jack Sullivan, the go-between for Rose and Police Lieut. Becker, was also actively engaged the night Rosenthal was shot. Sullivan, after a grilling test, told Commissioner Dougherty that when he left Lieut. Becker at Broadway and Forty-second street at 1:30 a.m., or 27 minutes before Rosenthal was shot, he went to "Bridge" Weber's place to find Sam Paul. He could not locate him, but did find there several gunmen.

Six men are now in custody in the Rosenthal case, one of whom is held as a material witness, and five others charged with being implicated in the crime. Oddly enough Commissioner Dougherty says that not one of the men who killed the gambler is under arrest.

District Attorney Whitman returned to the city today to take up the work with the grand jury in investigating the Rosenthal case. Lieut. Becker will be permitted to testify before the grand jury provided he agrees to waive all immunity. The public prosecutor makes no effort to hide his belief that the shadow of Becker rests upon the Rosenthal case, and in fact, Whitman takes the position that if Becker is as innocent as he says he is, he will seek to appear before the grand jury waiving all immunity.

The grand jury will also take up the charges that the police profited from gambling houses by allowing them to run without molestation.
