WONDERFUL ASSAULT OF CANADIANS AT CAPTURE OF COURCELETTE TOWN

Quebec Battalion Jumps Into the Fray Regardless of Life, Covering Itself With Glory.

CANADIAN CORPS HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, via London, Oct.
10.—When the first great attack was launched at 6:20 a.m. of September 15, the 5th Canadian Infantry Brigade was in divisional second reserve. One French-Canadian battalion was located in trenches, where for the greater part of the day they were only interested spectators. Over their heads the shells from the heavy batteries hurtled screaming through the air. All about them rows and rows of field guns


