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KAISER EXCHANGES MESSAGES ON PEACE

Tells King of Wuertemberg Hopes Germany Profits.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The hope of King William of Wuertemberg is expressed in a telegram from the king to the German chancellor, Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, as quoted in a Reuter dispatch from Amsterdam. The king's message, sent in response to the chancellor's congratulations on the 25th anniversary of his ascension to the throne, is quoted as follows:

"May God give a speedy and honorable peace, which will guarantee us further progress. May He guide your excellency, in whose wise leadership I firmly trust."

The following messages of congratulations from Emperor William to the king is forwarded in an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Amsterdam: "May your majesty before long bring to your people the blessings of peace and may that peace repay all German princes and subjects for the heavy sacrifices they have made for the fatherland."

THREE "OLD HEADS" TO LEAVE CABINET, IS LATEST RUMOR

Hanna, Pyne and Duff May Go With Premier.

HON. DR. REID ON VISIT

Just Talking "Generalities in General Way," He Says.

TORONTO, Oct. 10.—Hon. Dr. J. D. Reid, minister of customs, arrived at the provincial parliament buildings today and went into private conference with Premier Hearst. Outside the premier's office the atmosphere buzzed.

It was whispered that the federal minister carried about his person a title clear to the vacancy on Ontario's high court bench, and was endeavoring to pin it right on Mr. Hearst.

Hon. Dr. Reid was "amazed" at the report when asked concerning it when he emerged at the end of an hour's conference. "We were just talking generalities in a general way," was his sufficiently "general" comment.

He made no denial, but explained that he was just returning from the West and hadn't been at Ottawa lately. He said he couldn't be entrusted with such important negotiations.

But Queen's Park is a buzz. The latest rumor is that Premier Hearst's retirement will be accompanied by the retirement of three of the other present ministers, Hon. Messrs. Hanna, Pyne and Duff. Cabinet reconstruction and reorganization is to follow, with the problem of leadership to be determined, in the past, not at Toronto, but at Ottawa.

THOMAS KELLY'S APPEAL BEFORE SUPREME COURT

Hartley Duart, For Contractor, Seeks a New Trial.

OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—Hearing of the appeal of Thomas Kelly, the Winnipeg contractor, from the judgment of the court of appeal of Manitoba, on a reserved case on the conviction of the appellant by the jury at the trial before Justice Prendergast at Winnipeg in June last, was begun in the supreme court today. 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WONDERFUL ASSAULT ON CANADIANS AT CAPTURE OF COURCELETTE TOWN

Quebec Battalion Jumps Into the Fray Regardless of Life, Covering Itself With Glory.

CANADIAN CORPS HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, via London, Oct. 10.—The first great attack was launched at 6:20 a.m. of September 26th by the 5th Canadian Infantry Brigade in divisional second reserve. One French-Canadian battalion was located in trenches, where for the greater part of the day they were only interested spectators. Over their heads the shells from the heavy batteries hurtled screaming through the air. All about them rows and rows of machine guns and light howitzers were firing furiously, with a deafening, brazen crash of sound. As the morning passed reports came to them of the successful assaults by the 4th and 6th Brigades, but they had little expectation of being themselves called upon to take an active part in the battle.

Suddenly at 3:30 o'clock the regiment received marching orders. Each battalion in conjunction with the battalion on its left was at 6 o'clock called upon to advance to the assault and capture of the fortified village of Courcellette. Here indeed was a military problem and a task to test the most highly trained and disciplined troops. In the short space of two hours and a half battalion orders had to be issued and explained to all the officers and N.C.O.s who were to participate. Careful preparations had to be made and the battalion had to reach the point for the assault over very rough ground over two miles away. Yet this was done and all went like clockwork.

Battalion Well Prepared. The training of months and months, the detailed and patient labor of anticipation had prepared the battalion for this very contingency. The battalion finally set in motion and for a time continued its march forward. Two companies in single file advanced about forty-five yards apart, led by a line of about 600 yards, the right flank being covered by the 1st and 2nd companies. About 150 yards behind them came another company, also in single line and at an equal distance in the rear the last company in the main formation. In this way they reached the ridge, which conceals Martinière from view. From the trenches on this ridge the morning attack had been launched. There they entered the zone of hostile artillery fire. The ground, although dry, was a perfect confusion of shell holes and shattered trenches. At this point the two leading companies swung up on the right, in extended order, one man to every three yards. In this way they reached the houses in the western corner of Martinière, and their left flank was protected by the 1st and 2nd companies, which presently came into view.

Perfectly Executed. The manoeuvre could not have been more perfectly executed on the peaceful plains of Salisbury. In the fields of Valenciennes. And yet all about them was a continuous and deafening roar of high explosive shells and shrapnel and men fell killed or wounded.

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DESPERADOES BEAT BRANTFORD JAILER AND THE TURNKEY

One of Bad Pair Caught Near Hamilton.

SECURE KEYS AND FLIT

Governor Brown's Head Badly Battered—Lodged From Paris.

BRANTFORD, Oct. 10.—Two American desperadoes, William Smith and Joseph Harris, being held in the local jail this morning, made one of the most sensational cases of jail-breaking in the history of the county. Smith was captured near Hamilton late this afternoon.

Knocking Governor Brown and Turnkey Cook unconscious and stealing the keys they made their getaway through the governor's residence.

After a hard fight in Paris on Saturday the two men were arrested on a charge of stealing a horse blanket, but men answering their descriptions were thought to be wanted in Woodstock, Toronto and elsewhere for horse-stealing. From Paris the men were brought to the county jail and were being held for trial.

Although the alarm was given almost immediately by the wife of the governor the getaway was clean. The men escaped in their shirt sleeves without hats. When they were caught in the Turnkey Cook was knocked unconscious and before Mr. Brown could lock the door he was knocked senseless.

While in jail the pair fought against being photographed and having their finger prints taken. Although one of the men was overpowered and placed in front of the camera yesterday the officials were unable to get the picture. Mr. Brown's head was badly bruised from being battered against the cement floor.

ITALIANS HAVE ADVANCED HALF WAY ACROSS ALBANIA

Occupy Town on Voyvusa River, South-east of Tepelini.

ROME, via London, Oct. 10.—The official communication issued today regarding operations in Albania says: Yesterday occupied Kluza, southeast of Tepelini, on the Voyvusa River. Sunday night an enemy aeroplane sailed over Avlona and dropped a bomb, which caused no damage."

This announcement means that the Italians have advanced half-way across Lower Albania towards Greece.
