Ottawa, Aug. 12 .- A further slight drop in the cost of living during July is shown by the figures of the labor department for the month of July. Eggs, evaporated apples and prunes were reported higher, as also were rents. The chief decreases during the month were in beef (rib roast), lard, cheese and sugar. In prices, says the report, the movement continued downard. The chief decreases in wholesale prices appeared in cattle and beef, fresh fish, sugar and molasses, and in metals. Quite marked recoveries occurred, however, in hay, hogs and hog products, cheese, butter and eggs, and in raw furs. In grains, wheat and oats were down, while corn, barley and flaxseed advanced slightly.

In miscellaneous foods, beans, oranges, canned vegetables and breadstuffs were lower, but the rest of the group remained steady. In textiles, cottons were slightly higher, while silks showed a small decline.
