Ottawa, Jan. 19.-Most Rev Charles Hugh Gauthier, D. D., archbishop of thet metropolitan diocese of Ottawa, at 2:35 a.m. succumbed after a lengthy illness. The cause of death was stated to be intestinal grippe. His grace was 78 years old on

Property Worth \$7,764,340 Exempt From City Taxes The amount of tax-exempted property in the city continues to grow

and the 1922 assessment report on the total shows that, as compared with last year's assessment, the value of exempted property has been increased over a half million dollars. Part of the increase is on land and part on buildings. The value of property now exempted totals \$7,764,340. That the taxpayer might be better able to appreciate what this total exemption means, City Clerk Baker pointed out in his 1921 year's book
