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WOULD AMALGAMATE S. C. R. DEPARTMENT

Hon. Hugh Guthrie Inquires What Reductions Are Possible.

OTTAWA, May 2.—(By Canadian Press).—A request for information as to when it might be found possible either to wipe out the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment or amalgamate it with some other department was made by Hon.

MENNONITES TO COME BACK TO FORMER HOMES

Find Bandit-Infested Mexico Not To Their Liking.

GOVERNMENT TO AID

Manitoba Administration Will Make Certain School Concessions.

WINNIPEG, May 2.—The Norris government has now in hand the bringing back to Manitoba of large numbers of stranded Mennonites in the Chihuahua district, the Villa bandit-infested tableland in North Mexico.

Delegations have waited on the government the last few days to see what can be done.

The state of the people who left Southern Manitoba and Swift Current, Sask., district is very distressing and pitiable, according to Mennonites who remained in Manitoba, but who have been communicated with by settlers in Mexico. Only the most stubborn of Mennonites now want to remain. As a concession to the returning Mennonites, the Norris government has decided to hand over to the Mennonites for local administration 200 schools in their district which have been administered by the school commissioner for the Norris government. F. J. Greenway, son of the former premier.

Johann Froese and a delegation will leave shortly for the Mennonite colony in Mexico to make arrangements to bring members of the Canadian colony back to Manitoba. Land on which they are located is on tableland, which is very high and dry, and it will be impossible to plant a crop on it this year.

Three Mennonites of Altona, Man., district, Peter P. Hamm, Johann Froese and Bernhard Sawatsky, returned from Mexico today after making a survey of living and farming conditions at the Mennonite colony in Mexico. They said the climate had proved too hot, and otherwise they did not like Mexico as well as Manitoba.

Soviet Women Display Savage Cruelty In Administering Justice

COPENHAGEN, May 2.—Opinions may vary greatly with regard to Bolshevik rule in Russia, but on one point at least all who know something of the Russia of today agree—namely, that no other country in the world places its women so absolutely on a level with the men as Russia of the present day.

In Russia the women have acquired an enormous political influence. The best-known type in the past was perhaps the female nihilist, pale, with her hair cut short and burning fanatical eyes.

This type has now been replaced by another far less sympathetic—for instance, the female judge, a girl of the people, low-bred, and vulgar, dressed in short petticoat, high boots, and coarsely made up with the most primitive beautifiers, who, cigarette in mouth, her feet on the table, condemns or pardons her fellowmen at her own discretion.

Another type is the female policeman, who, rifle over her shoulder, patrols the streets, shooting at casual passers-by who have been unlucky enough to displease her.

The most unbecoming type of Bolshevik woman is, however, the female executioner. She is doing her work methodically and with the utmost coolness.

The notorious Cheka, which consists of spies and provokers, has several prominent female members—for instance, Mrs. Jakoleva and Mrs. Stasova, both of whom belong to the intellectual class.

These women now sign death sentences and display a cruelty that seems almost incredible in the present days.

This cruelty is due partly to spiritual degeneration, partly to a revolutionary mysticism which has seized the women of Russia, who still retain their Communist faith—the faith which many of the formerly warm adherents of Lenin have now begun to lose.

WORK STARTED ON NEW I. O. O. F. HOME

WINNIPEG, May 2.—Work started Tuesday on what will be the most pretentious Oddfellows' home in Canada, for aged members and their wives, and for the education of orphans of members.

The cost will be \$250,000. It is being erected by the Grand Lodge of Manitoba. The site is on the Assiniboine River west of the city limits.

At present there are 60 of these homes on the continent, but there is only one other in Canada, and that is in Toronto.

SAYS ARTIFICIAL
ARMS NOT USED

OTTAWA, May 2.—(By Canadian Press).—That a high percentage of amputation cases, where the amputation was above the elbow, were not wearing the artificial arms supplied by the government, was stated this morning before the committee on soldiers' civil re-establishment by W. S. Dobbs, president of the Toronto branch of the amputations association of the Great War. Mr. Dobbs criticized the government arms, and declared that amputated arms should be spliced in order to make the men more efficient. This was the main difficulty the amputation cases had with the D. S. C. R. He also criticized an alleged shortage of medical assistance in the government limb factories.

U. S. TRADE WITH CANADA DECLINES

WASHINGTON, May 2.—United States exports to Canada fell off some \$4,000,000 during March as compared with the same month a year ago, while imports from Canada decreased to \$5,000,000, according to foreign trade reports issued today by the United States Commerce Department.

Exports to Canada during March were valued at \$45,000,000, as against \$49,000,000 for the same month in 1921. Imports were valued at \$26,000,000, as compared with \$31,000,000.

REVIVES ISSUE OF SOLDIERS' BONUS

OTTAWA, May 2.—The principle of the cash bonus for all returned soldiers as a step toward complete re-establishment, was again advocated before the house committee on G. R. McNichol, member of the Dominion executive of the Grand Army of United Veterans.

Mr. McNichol suggested the government issue four bonds on each soldier, the bonds to mature in five-year periods, the first series to mature five years after the date of issue.

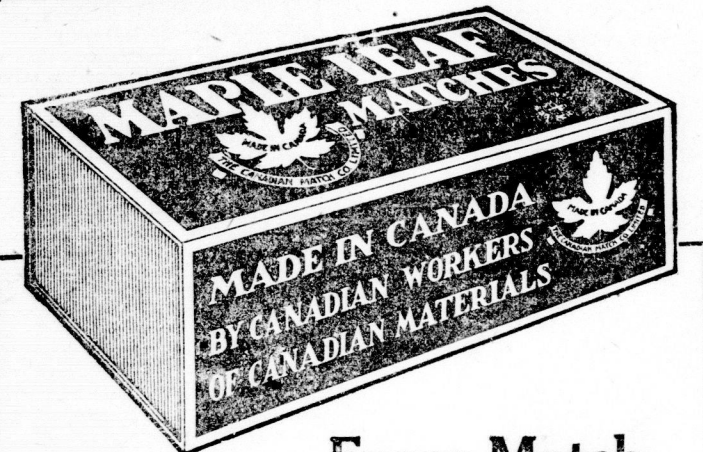
