Adopts Measure After Defeat of Clause To Create National Council.

Senator Pardee Stresses Dominion's Need For "Sturdy, Individual Canadianism."

OTTAWA, May 18 .- (By Canadian Press.)-The national defence bill was finally adopted by the senate headed by W. Elliot (South today, after the clause creating a national defence council was de feated. The chief criticism on this point was the salary of \$4,500 per annum paid the deputy minister of militia as vice-president of the

council. An amendment by Senator Dandurand, which restricted emolument to the vice-president of the proposed council, was previously defeated.

Senator Pope called the attention of the government to the deplorable condition which surrounded many of the settlers under the soldiers' land settlement scheme, and asked if the government proposed to take any action for their relief.

Senator Dandurand replied that big problem had arisen out of land settlement. The House of Commons had appointed a special committee to investigate the question of sol diers' civil re-establishment, and the government's policy would be formulated on the findings of that committee.

Senator Griesbach drew the atten tion of the government to the census racial classification, and the rumor that it was to be changed. At present there was no recognition of Canadian nationality, and each person must state the race from which he sprung. He believed that this present system should be main-
