Strict enforcement of the Highway Traffic Act which says that during March and April the load mut not be more than 2,500 pound on any vehicle with wheel tire of 21/2 inches in width will be the order, says County Engin-eer Charles Talbot.

'A great deal of damage is done every year by breaches of this act," he says.
"I have found that the largest number of violations come from the vicinities of cheese, powder, and condensed milk factories. That is where I shall be especially watchful this year. In many cases men leave hauling which should have been done in the fall to the spring, and then, of course, put on big loads to save time. I have 97 road foremen in the county who are instructed to inform me of all breaches of the act, and I shall act immediately whenever I am thus informed. 
