Beatty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific, announced a new arrangement entered into between the Canadian railroads and the government, by which, he said, it was hoped to very materially stimulate the movement of desirable immigrants to Canada. Under this arrangement, the two railway companies, through their colonization department, have been given a free hand to select, transport and distribute all colonists who can be properly assimilated in Canada, with the further privilege of issuing the necessary permits for their admission, subject to the requirements of the statute and the nental and physical fitness of the applicant.


