Construction Conditions in Dominion Are Healthy-Quebec Leads in Total, But Ontario Highest in Ordinary Building.

Positive indications of strong upward tendencies in Canadian construction are shown in the fact that for the second month in succession the construction awards have exceeded those for the corresponding months of 1924, according to MacLean Building Reports, Limited. Last month's figure is the second largest September

total since 1913. The contracts awarded totalled \$29,746,400, compared with \$22,506,300 for September a year ago. Residential building accounted for 25.7 per cent of the August total and amounted to \$7,651,300. Business buildings totalled \$7,376,800, or 24.8 per cent; industrial buildings, \$354,000, or 1.2 per cent; and public works and utilities \$14,364,300, or 48.3 per cent. The activity was distributed among the

provinces, as follows: Quebec, 51.8 per cent; Ontario, 33.4 per cent Prairie Provinces, 10.9 per cent; British Columbia, 2.6 per cent, and the Maritime Provinces, 1,3 per cent. To Quebec goes the credit for the large contracts awarded totals recorded during the past two months. The increase of more than six million dollars is due to greater development in the pulp and paper industry and in bridges, roads and other engineering projects.

Ontario lags behind last year when grand totals are compared, but in the building classifications, emitting engineering contracts, an increase of more than seven million dollars is shown.
