**NEW PULP MILLS IN
GASPE COUNTY**
Great Eastern Pulp Company Will
Erect and Operate Extensive
Pulp Industry

A large and important industry is to be established in the Gaspé Peninsula and more than \$1,000,000 will be expended. The Great Eastern Pulp Company has just been organized for the purpose of erecting and operating extensive pulp and lumber mills at Madeline River, Gaspé County, Que. An inexhaustible timber supply, a splendid water power, a deep water port and connection with two short railway lines projected and to be built very soon to connect with the Canadian Government railway system induced the promoters to locate in the county.

Three hundred thousand acres of timberland have been transferred to the new corporation which will issue \$600,000 bonds and the same amount in stock, both already largely subscribed.

The majority of the directors are Canadians, although John Melles of Bangor, is president. Archibald Hay Cook, K. C., of Paspébiac, is vice-president, and Fergus Murphy, K. C., of Quebec, secretary. One of the directors is Garret Schneck of New York president of the Great Northern paper mills of Millinocket and Madison. Mr. Hardie S. Ferguson of New York, will be in charge of the construction work, contracts for which have already been let.

The pulp mill will have a capacity of 300,000 tons of ground pulp wood annually and the annual output of the saw mill will be 10,000,000 feet of long lumber. The plant is expected to be ready for operation by November 1st. Hundreds of workmen will be employed.

HOPETOWN POST OFFICE

Mr. Patenaude:

1. Daily except Sunday from Paspébiac.

The original contract, which provided for a semi-daily service between Paspébiac and the railway station and for a daily service between Paspébiac and Hopetown, was entered into at the rate of \$260 per annum, but, owing to the fact that one train per day which carried mail to Paspébiac was cut off, the service between Paspébiac and railway station was reduced to six trips per week, and a corresponding reduction was made in the rate of payment to the contractor, thereby bringing the present amount paid him to \$208 per annum. The contract was awarded on April 12, 1915.

The mails for Carleton West are carried by Edmund Allard at a cost of \$75. per annum under a contract dating from the 1st July, 1916.

3 and 4. Tenders were not invited as the offers received on the establishment of the service were considered reasonable.

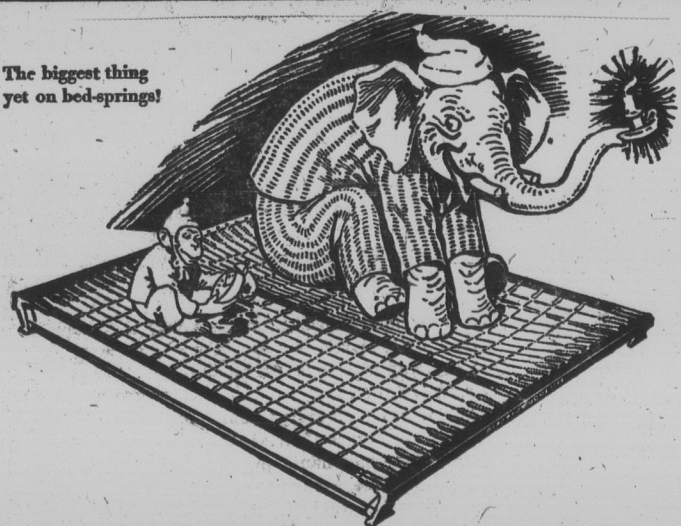
