When the Great Western railway was built he made large profits by supplying it with iron. He afterwards staked a large sum in getting control of the Woodstock and Lake Erie railway, and though he got the control, he lost his money. This was the beginning of the financial weakening f of his firm, which afterwards went through more than oue disastrous experience. Finally the business was wound up, and Mr. Buchanan was a ruined man. But he rose superior to misfortune, and the integrity of his soul remained untarnished. That beautiful home of his on "che mountain," at Hamilton, was deserted, and in a few years fell into decay; the fine grounds, covering nine acres, from a paradise became a waste. It




