In color the dogs are generally tawny, not brindled, with black muzzles, or black and tan, the latter being the St. Hubert's breed, the hardiest and best of its kind, the truest and most faithful.

There are species of the animal known as the Cuban bloodhound and the Siberian bloodhound, which are not bloodhounds at all. The former were trained by the Spaniards at first to pursue Indians, and were afterwards employed in the capture of fugitive negro slaves. They are descendants of the mastiff, crossed probably with the bulldog. Their scenting powers are far inferior to those of the true bloodhound, while, on the other hand, they are ferocious and will attack their prey. The hounds.
