## EIGHTEEN DEAD IN BELFAST RIOTS

Fifty Persons are Seriously Wounded and Eighty More Hurt. Irish Situation Critical

Belfast, Nov. 24—Eighteen are dead, seventy-five seriously wounded and eighty less severely hurt as the result of the fierce rioting in Belfast this week.

Thursday, the 9 o'clock curfew was ordered imposed in the affected area in East Belfast and the notorious riot center on the Antrim side of the river Logan, and including North Queen street, York street and the dock area, where the present troubles arose.

The police and military are at the disposal of the new Ulster government.

During the morning a woman of middle age was shot and critically wounded.

Occasional bursts of firing occurred during the dinner hour in several districts, causing pedestrians to flee for safety.

### EIGHTEEN DEAD

Five persons were killed yesterday in the sniping and sporadic outbreaks of shooting which took place in various parts of the city. Order had been restored at 8:30 o'clock in the evening. The curfew took effect in some parts of the city at nine o'clock.

At three o'clock next morning a man standing in Royal Avenue, the city's main artery, was shot. He was watching shooting which was taking place in York street. During the afternoon a woman was killed and two men and two women were wounded and taken to hospitals. Some of those now in hospitals are said to be in a serious condition.

When the disorder broke out in the York street area the streets were almost impassable. Tram car service had been suspended. Two men boldly lay down on the pavement and began firing toward Royal Avenue. It was during this shooting that the man in York street was wounded.

### IRISH SITUATION CRITICAL

London, Nov. 25—After to-day's meeting between the Sinn Fein representatives and the cabinet committee, the Irish situation was described in government circles as "as critical but not hopeless."

Premier Lloyd George explained to the Sinn Fein that the government was willing to apply strong moral pressure to Ulster and to offer Sir James Craig, Premier of Ulster, attractive financial inducements to persuade him to agree to the only possible settlement—an all-Ireland parliament.

But if these proposals were rejected, either by the Sinn Fein or Ulster, he declared the government would not introduce any act in parliament which would include Ulster against her will. The government explained that to force Ulster to accept would require the sending of troops, in defiance of the pledges of all parties against physical coercion.

Lloyd George will discuss the question further with the Ulster premier on Friday, after which Sir James will return to Belfast for the formal re-opening of the northern parliament.

**SINN FEIN BOYCOTT**  
Earl Middleton, as representative of the southern Unionists, is continuing to strive for a settlement on dominion lines. "He is pointing out to London business men not only the moral, but the material advantages to be gained by closer commercial relations with Ireland."

Disappointment is felt by the government that notwithstanding the truce the Sinn Fein has not withdrawn the boycott on Ulster goods. The Sinn Fein maintain that the boycott was provoked by the discharge of Catholic workmen from Belfast shipyards, and consider it an essential aid to the republican cause.

Ulster still is pressing for the publication of all the correspondence which has been exchanged during the peace negotiations, but the government has not yet agreed, although declaring it will be given to the public eventually.

### SECRET CIRCULAR WITHDRAWN

London, Nov. 23—Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier, has ordered the withdrawal of what has been described as a secret circular issued recently from the divisional commission of the Royal Irish Constabulary at Belfast, which, according to Dublin despatches, said the government was considering the desirability of forming the unauthorized Loyalist defense forces into regular military units, to be called out in grave emergencies.

The Ulster premier declared to-day that he approved recruiting for special constabulary in event of the truce being terminated but not for the formation of recruits into regular military units.

"The constabulary," he added, "was never transferred to the government of northern Ireland. Recruits may be taken as policemen, but not into

a military force for organization."

Sir James announced that he will return to Belfast on Saturday.

The Irish Bulletin of Dublin last Friday published the text of the alleged secret circular, which was dated November 9th and addressed to "the commissioners, all county inspectors and all county commandants."

Next day Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, and the Irish office in London disclaimed knowledge of the issuance of the circular. The Irish officials said they were unable to repudiate it, however, declaring it probable it might have been directed from some Dublin castle source without their knowledge.

### DOOR OF HOPE NOT YET CLOSED

London, Nov. 23—Lord Birkenhead, speaking at a luncheon shortly after leaving the conference with the Sinn Fein delegates, said it would not be right to invite his hearers to a too sanguine view of the difficult and critical negotiations going on respecting Ireland, but he could say that the door which excluded hope was not yet definitely closed.

### A CURIOUS CITY

The most curious city in the United States of America is the capital, Washington.

To prevent j-alony between the various states it is not in any one state but in an entirely separate area called the "District of Columbia," in which the inhabitants have no votes whatever, but are ruled by a commission appointed by the Federal Government.

The city was planned by a Frenchman, L'Enfant, on the lines of Versailles. The capitol, the building in which Congress meets, is in the center of the city, and all the main streets radiate from it and are named after the different states.

Nearly is the Congressional Library, which contains, among other interesting documents, the original "Declaration of Independence." While he is in office the President of the United States lives at Washington, in the White House.

Outside the city is Mount Vernon, George Washington's home. It belongs to the state and is open to the public, the rooms being filled with eighteenth-century furniture and relics of the Washingtons.

### CARELESSNESS WITH FORESTS MUST CEASE

Failure to establish state forests has been—by lack of precedent and example—a serious handicap to progressive forestry in Great Britain. It is from lack of this that much of the forestry of to-day, not only in Great Britain, but in those parts of the world mainly occupied by men of British descent, has often been haphazard and unsatisfactory. The extent of virgin forests that have been acquired by the Empire at different stages of her growth has no doubt tended towards carelessness and indifference. In this respect we have been the spoilt darlings of fortune. We have succeeded to vast areas of exploitable woods and have only had to draw on new territories to meet our increasing requirements.—Lord Lovat, at Empire Timber Conference.

### MAN ACCIDENTALLY SHOT AT ST. JOHN

St. John, Nov. 23—Frank Brown, of 48 Brook street, this city, was accidentally shot in the neck this afternoon by his cousin, Watson Powers. He was taken to the General Public Hospital, where it was found that the bullet was deeply lodged in his neck. The police are holding Powers awaiting developments. Both men say that the shooting was purely accidental.

### C. N. R. EMPLOYEES WOULD MAKE A GREAT CITY

If the 55,000 employees of the C.N.R. were domiciled in one spot, instead of being spread from one end of the country to the other, they would constitute a city larger than Hamilton, Calgary or Halifax. For it must be remembered that it is not only the people who actually work for the C.N.R. that are sustained by it, but their wives and families. This tremendous body of workers are actuated by one motive, to make the C.N.R. the most successful publicly owned enterprise in the world, to run it as purely a business enterprise, divorced entirely from politics.

A. No. The United States possesses about three times as much timber as Canada, and Russia is regarded as much better endowed with timber than the United States of America.

### CAPTURING A NEW MARKET

Canada's flour is the standard of the world. This is pretty generally admitted. The writer knows one citizen of the United States who, on every visit he makes to Canada, carries home, under strict instructions from his wife, a number of loaves of bread, she claiming that no bread obtainable in the United States can approach that made from Canadian flour. As an instance of the increasing popularity of Canadian flour, it is interesting to note that Dr. A. H. Stafford, born in Winnipeg but for some time past domiciled in Jamaica, recently said that until the steamships "Canadian Forester" and "Canadian Fisher" of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine Service came into Kingston last spring, every pound of flour used on the Island came from the United States. Now it all comes from Canada. This very valuable market for Canadian products has been captured by three ways. Dr. Stafford affirms: First, the fact that Canada had ships to deliver it there; Second, the quality of the flour itself; and Third, the fact that the people of Jamaica desire closer commercial and social relations with the people of Canada.

### WHEAT PRODUCTION

Canada is now the second wheat producing country in the world, according to 1921 statistics. ### IMMIGRANTS WILL GO TO CUBA

Montreal, Nov. 23—Through the intervention of the Jewish Aid Society, 250 immigrants who recently arrived at Halifax from Eastern Europe, will not have to return to their native land as they ordinarily would under the immigration law which prevents their entrance to the Dominion. They are going to Cuba under special agreement with the Cuba Government.


