The Masonic Temple.

A representative of the Nor-Western yesterday afternoon met Dr. Lindsay and having remarked that he would like to take a run over the new Masonic Temple, the doctor at once extended an invitation. The pair accordingly pointed in the direction of the new edifice, which is situated a few feet east of Parrish's produce emporium, Stephen avenue, east. At the invitation of Dr. Lindsay our representative entered the building, and ascended by a spacious stairway to the lodge room. The room 23x30. It is a cozy room with sky-light, down which we suspect the grand old Master will come. The stables are all complete, and although the walls are not yet complete the room is comfortable. Adjacent are the necessary ante rooms. The spacious room on the ground floor is suitable for a public hall, and we trust that the enterprise of our citizens will be commensurate with the occasion. The building is a frame structure, 24x40, two stories. It has been erected by Messrs Jarret and Cushing, at a cost of \$1500. The workmanship reflects credit on the builders, and the temple besides being a credit to the ancient craft of this town is one of the many buildings which have been erected during the past summer, and it is an ornament to the place. Dr. Lindsay who is away up in the mysteries of free-masonry's, associated with Mayor Murdoch, are entitled to a great deal of credit for this enterprise.

NEWS DIAL.

Further shocks of earthquake have been felt at Grand, Ustara, Nergo and Algero. The panic at latest accounts continues unabated. A royal decree has been issued ordering a mutual subscription for the relief of the sufferers.

Another dynamite scare has taken place in London. It occurred on the underground railway between Grover street and King's Cross station, January 2nd, in the evening. The shock overthrew several waytars on the Easton Road, but no one was severely hurt.

Dr. Alain Clark, Mr. Gladstone's physician, has ordered him to desist from work of any description.

The fires of insurrection are smoldering in Constantinople. The committee of the Privy Council to whom the Manitoba question has been referred consists of Sir David Macpherson, Sir Leonard Tilley, Sir Alex. Campbell, Hon. J. H. Pope and Hon. A. P. Caron. It is understood that as soon as all the members of the Government arrive in Ottawa on a full meeting of the Council is had, the whole matter will be dealt with and probably decided finally. Hon. Messrs. Norquay and Murray are awaiting the final decision, which it is expected will be given at an early date.

An Orange outbreak took place at Bay Roberts, St. John, N.F., January 4th. The New York redemptionist Fathers who were holding a mission at that place were besieged and imprisoned in their dwellings. The United States Consul at St. John has demanded from Governor Glover protection for the lives and property of United States citizens. The British Consulate Tenados has been ordered to Bay Roberts, and a large body of police have been despatched there. General Grant is physically prostrated.

Mobs have been running things on the Baltimore and Ohio Railway.

Col. Richardson of Regina is assisting the Government in the preparation of legislation for the northwest which will be enacted at the approaching session of parliament.

Advices dated 30th December state that Gen. Gordon was then safe.

Princess Beatrice has been betrothed to Prince Henry of Battenberg.

Greenwich Observatory began the new system of universal time at midnight, January 1.

Alex. Manning (Conservative) has been elected mayor of Toronto.

LONDON, Jan. 4.—Col. Majendie has concluded that the agent used in the explosion was a percussion bomb similar to that used in the murder of Czar Alexander II., and that it was thrown from a train going westward. It is supposed that the explosive substance was contained in a ball of glass. The debris at the place of the explosion is being sifted, with a view to finding pieces of the bomb.

General Wolesey is making satisfactory progress in the Sudan.

Earl Granville declines to give his consent to the proposal to hold a formal conference on the Egyptian question at Paris. He proposes instead that an informal meeting be held at the British Embassy at Paris, to be presided over by Lord Lyons, the British Ambassador, at which the other foreign Ambassadors accredited to France shall have the privilege of taking part in the discussion but no. of voting.

Wm. Freston, a solicitor offers a brand new theory regarding the explosion. Freston, it seems, was engaged in the defence of Dr. Gallagher, and he says that the dynamite unjustly suspect him of having given information to the Government. He admits that he conferred with the prosecuting counsel, but claims that all he did was done in the interest of his client, and he indignantly denies the charge that he received a reward from the Government.
