1. Four.

2. Zone No. 1, west, Loretta avenue; north, C.N. crosstown tracks, Loretta avenue to Rideau canal, thence Rideau canal from crosstown tracks to Mann avenue; east, Hurdman road; south, Rideau river from Bronson avenue to Hurdman's bridge.

Zone No. 2—west, Rideau canal and Hurdman road; south and west, St. Laurent boulevard; north, Ottawa river.

Zone No. 3—east, Loretta avenue and C.P.R. crosstown tracks; south, Carling avenue; west, Ninth avenue; north, Ottawa river.

Zone No. 4—west, C.P.R. crosstown tracks; north, Ottawa river; east, Rideau canal; south, C.N. crosstown tracks.

- 3. 1, 23; 2, 38; 3, 24; 4, 36.
- 4. Letter carriers report for duty at 7 a.m. and 1 p.m. and terminate when their duty is completed. The time of completion varies, but period of duty is usually within 8 hours.
- 5. One and two delivery walks, two loads daily; three delivery walks, three loads daily. Bundles are dropped for the carriers as required either in relay boxes or at suitable authorized points.
