EXTENSION OF MANPOWER MOBILITY PROGRAM TO FARM LABOUR AND INDIANS

Earlier today the hon. gentleman made a statement about the revised manpower mobility program. Hon. Jean Marchand (Minister of Manpower and Immigration): Mr. Speaker, I think it is clear that we shall have to postpone that part of the program until we can find good definitions and have better administrative rulings than we have at present. However, the intention is to cover farmers too, and I hope we can do it as soon as possible.

Mr. E. Nasserden (Rosthern): Mr. Speaker, a number of us are wondering whether grants available under the mobility policy will also be available to the first citizens of Canada, our Indians.

Mr. Marchand: As far as the first citizens of Canada are concerned, if they fulfil the requirements of the legislation I do not see why they should not be entitled to the same advantages as others.
