**\*LAKEHEAD ELEVATOR STORAGE SPACE**

Question No. 2,199—**Mr. Muir (Lisgar):**

1. What is the total storage space of the Terminal Elevators at the Lakehead?

2. What is the total storage space owned by (a) each of the Prairie Pools (b) individual line elevators?

3. What was the total amount of grain shipped from the terminals from January 1, 1969 to April 30, 1969?

3. How many bushels of grain has been shipped out of each Pool or line elevator terminal during the above period?

**Hon. H. A. Olson (Minister of Agriculture):** Mr. Speaker, the answer to this question is as follows:

1. 107,321,110 bushels.

2. (a) Saskatchewan wheat pool, 36,117,210 bushels; Manitoba pool elevators, 17,080,000 bushels; (b) Federal Grain Limited, 21,200,000 bushels; United Grain Growers, 13,000,000 bushels; Richardson Terminals Ltd., 9,500,000 bushels; National Grain Co. Ltd., 5,835,000 bushels; Canada Malting Co. Ltd., 2,888,900 bushels; Parrish & Heimbecker Ltd., 1,700,000 bushels.

3. 37,200,644 bushels of the principal grains.

4. The Statistics Act does not permit the disclosure of information concerning operations of individual companies. However, total shipments from terminals were: Wheat pool terminals, 15,297,268 bushels; Line elevator terminals, 19,508,239 bushels; Private terminals, 2,395,137 bushels.
