Whereas such a tax will constitute the worst ever grab on the already low income of Canadians, not only because of higher taxes but also because of the higher cost of living due to the higher inflation, interest rates and unemployment brought about by this new tax.

Wherefore, your petitioners humbly pray and call upon Parliament to reject the proposed goods and services tax and in duty bound, your petitioners will ever pray.
