Those Offered Yesterday for Export Fell Short of the Standard.

BUSINESS VERY SLOW

About Dozen Cars Were Sold. Majority of Trading Being Inactive.

The receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards yesterday numbered 83 cars, including 827 cattle, 8 calves, 694 hogs, 1023 sheep and lambs and 480 horses. The Friday market for choice heavy steers opened with about 1300 cattle in the pens, but a large proportion of these fell short of the class American buyers have orders for, consequently it devolved upon local operators to lift these butchers' beeves. The trading was very slow and continued so until the last minute of the close and prices broke considerably. Only about a dozen cars were sold

for export. As intimated before, steers, well-finshed and fat, we gning around 1350 to day's market. No plain or "counterfeit" animals will go at tancy prices, and all cattle, no matter where offered for sale, a producing basis. will only fall into their class when juuged by experts. And many yesterday fell short of the desired standard and were disappointing to the operature and more

When the smoke cleared away choice heavy steers held about steady with last Friday, those averaging around 1400 los. Soing at \$8.25 to \$8.55. The next quanty grade of steers about 1300 lbs., which last week brought \$7.80 to \$8.25, lost about 40c per cwt. steers and hellers led 20c compared with this week's previous trading. There were too many butoners' casses for the local trade to care for, and all told about 300 cattle did not sell.

There is a chance for this Friday market if shippers will hold to fill only the shipping demand, which calls for exporters only of the best grades and weighty. Paokers' price for hogs next week will be around \$5.75 fed and watered.

ADANAC STARTS UP BY DEWATERING SHAFT
