HE Year 1701 was productive of very great Events; the Death of the unfortunate James II, and the Acknowledging by France the Title of his pretended Son, in direct Violation of the Treaty at Rywick, were none of the least. - France did not stop there; as she had placed one of her Grandsons on the Throne of Spain, she began to act more openly, by plainly shewing that she had nothing less in View than to subject all the other Powers in Europe to her arbitrary Will: to ftem therefore the further Progress of so dangerous an Enemy was the chief Reason that induced those Powers to enter into the Grand Alliance, and that produced almost a general War in Europe; happy if the Conclusion had been equal to the Success that attended it for ten Campaigns! a Success scarcely to be parallelled in ancient or modern Relation, and raised the Reputation of the British Arms to a Height not known before.
