

all cases where the District wishes to alter an existing law, they shall propose a new law in full, as a substitute for the one they wish to alter. When the Directors find two or more propositions in conformity with each other, one only shall be inserted.

202. That all applications for new districts, and applications from lodges for permission to join other districts, shall be inserted in the March reports, or the same shall not be submitted to the A. M. C.

203. That the quarterly reports and the resolutions of the A. M. C. shall be read in the lodges on the first lodge night after having received the same. *Lodges neglecting to do so to be fined two shillings and sixpence for each offence,—to be paid to the Widows' and Orphans' fund.*

204. That all applications to the A. M. C. for relief, shall have the approbation of a committee of the district, and all such applications to be forwarded to the C. S. of the Order, at least fourteen days previous to the A. M. C.

205. That the whole of the laws for the government of the Order shall be published in a book, to be called "The General Laws," and sold to lodges for the use of members.

Breaking a Law to which there is no Fine attached.

206. That any district, lodge, or member, breaking a law to which there is no fine attached, the committee before whom the case is tried shall have power to inflict such fine as they may think the case deserves, not exceeding twenty-five shillings, nor less than two shillings and sixpence. *And wherever the word "month" occurs, it shall be understood to mean calendar month.*
