LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEES.

Bank of Nova Scotia's Jamaica Bill Withdrawn in Favor of Government Bill.

A COUPLE OF BILLS PASSED ALONG.

Public Accounts Committee Had Some Lawyers' Accounts Under Consideration.

Ottawa, June 28.—In the Banking and Commerce Committee this morning the bill to authorize the Bank of Nova Scotia to issue sterling notes for circulation in the Island of Jamaica was withdrawn in consequence of the Government bill covering the same ground for all banks.

The Canadian Bankers' Investment and Savings Company's bill, announced and reported, as was the Imperial Loan and Investment Company of Canada's bill.

Railway Bill Thrown Out.

The Senate Railway Committee this morning threw out the Portage du Fort and Bristol Harbour bill.

Some Lawyers' Bills Investigated.

In the Public Accounts Committee this morning, Mr. F. N. Giesbrecht of the Department of Justice was examined in the matter of Hon. J. S. Hall's account in connection with the prosecution of Contractor St. Louis in the Curran bridge transaction. He gave evidence as to the rates of pay given agents of the department in Quebec, in order to fix a standard by which to test Mr. Howell's charges in the Manitoba election fraud trials. He was examined also in regard to Mr. B. B. Osler's account in the Connolly-McGreery investigation and those of O'Connor and Rogers in the same matter. This occupied the whole morning, and will be followed at some future time by examining Mr. Howell's charges in the Manitoba cases with these.

THE SIGHT OF A LIFETIME.

Saturday Will Be the Day of the Grand Review at Niagara Camp—See It.

What a just feeling of pride every true Canadian must experience when he gazes on the many forms of the many stalwart young soldiers doing duty for their country in the way of the annual camp at Niagara-on-the-Lake!

A raw recruit is taken, one who has never handled a gun before in his life, and in ten days is fit to be placed on the firing line of any army. The sight is certainly a remarkable record, but only goes to prove that the Canadian young man of to-day is making his mark in any calling he may undertake.

The day on which the camp may be seen to the best advantage will be Saturday next, Dominion Day, at which time the grand review will take place, when 8000 soldiers will be seen in line. They will be reviewed by Lord Minto and all the military heads of Canada, and some of the American officers who are not at the front in Manila.

Three American biograph firms have made arrangements to take pictures of soldiers while in actual battle, a sham fight to take place after the review.

The Niagara River Line steamers have made special rates and arrangements to handle the large crowds expected on that day. Also, special rates to Niagara Falls and Buffalo for the day and to remain over the Fourth of July.

Admitted to Partnership.

We notice from a card in the financial column of The World that Mr. E. D. Fraser has been admitted to partnership in the firm of A. E. Ames & Co., the King street bankers and brokers. Mr. Fraser has for some time been chief of the office staff, and has the respect of all those with whom he comes in contact. He has well deserved the promotion to his present most enviable position, and his many friends will wish him and the house with which he is now so intimately identified a long lease of continued prosperity. Messrs. A. E. Ames & Co., have, we see, arranged to open an office in Cleveland on July 1 with Mr. J. R. Perry as manager. Mr. F. J. Donahue, an accountant. It is understood that the firm have already an important connection in that city, and they are sure to be a factor in financial transactions of an international character. Mr. Perry, who joined the firm's office last year, was a fellow of Toronto University, and has had considerable experience in financial matters. He recently published a small work giving a complete history of the debt of the Dominion and the various Provinces, and Mr. Donahue has been assistant accountant in the office for some years, and has earned his new position.

Lucky People at Duluth.

Duluth, Minn., June 28.—Archibald Kent and sister, Mrs. Frank A. Desnoere, have received notices from London solicitors that they have fallen heirs to one-third of a fortune valued at \$600,000 in mining property in Wales and 200 houses in and near London, by the death of E. P. Bailey, a uncle in London. His oldest son was a lieutenant in the American army, and died of fever at Tampa.

Three strikers Were Killed.

Berlin, June 28.—Three strikers were killed during the rioting at the Bochum coal mines. The number of men wounded is not known, as many of them were spirited away to private houses. Thirty-six arrests were made yesterday, and troops to protect the non-union strikers were sent to the scene of the disturbance.

SLOW DAY AT THE CITY HALL.

Firemen Desire to Protect Their Superannuation Fund for the Future.

FINE GIFT OF MR. J. W. FLAVELLE

Of Eight Pair of Pheasants, in Addition to the Collection in Riverdale Park.

The Fire and Light Committee held an uneventful meeting yesterday afternoon. Of two deputations one was representing the Fire Department Superannuation Committee. The firemen made two requests. They asked the privilege of examining the medical certificates of accepted applicants for positions on the brigade, and they wanted to enforce the production of a certificate of good moral character by each applicant from some clergyman or other approved person.

Their object, they said, was to protect the fund. They wanted to guard against cases where applicants might pass the required medical inspection all right, but might afterwards ruin their health by immoral indiscretions and thereby become a drag upon the fund.

The committee endorsed Ald. Sheppard in admitting that the request was a most reasonable and worthy one. "But there must be some reason," thought Ald. Davies, for making such suggestions. "If there have been any appointments made lately to which these suggestions would apply, the committee ought to know it."

The fund committee were required to formulate a letter setting forth their wishes and meantime the Civic Committee will look up bylaws bearing on the case.

Make Drivers Permanent.

Another unwritten regulation which the committee is disposed to make iron-clad is found in a notice of motion by Ald. Hubbard. It makes the position of driver a permanent one, the object being to prevent continued changing, in order to have all drivers familiar with city streets in all quarters.

Mrs. Meyers Always.

By recommendation of a sub-committee and by consent of the Parks and Exhibition Committee, Mrs. Meyers, the caterer at High Park, is to be allowed three fire extinguishers at a cost to the city of \$34 for the protection of her premises. Another extinguisher, costing \$11, is to be placed at the caretaker's, and a fifth at the Howard Lodge. They will cost \$55 in all.

The Board of Control were asked to consider the application of the district chiefs and foremen for reinstatement of salaries to the figure existing before the cut. The board neglected this when taking up the estimates.

Who Said They Were to Report?

Chief Graham and Secretary McGowan are preparing a report on fire protection for the new City Hall. They will submit it to a joint meeting of the Fire and Light Committee and a sub-committee of property tax.

The sum of \$2003, held in trust by the city for the Firemen's Benefit Fund Association, was ordered to be paid over to the estate of the late Donald Gibson.

Permission was refused Mr. Van Zandt to store all in the old Toronto Carpet Co. building.

Mr. Flavelle's Gift.

The Parks and Exhibition Committee adopted a Shagbark reservation as follows: "That this committee accepts with very great pleasure the magnificent gift to the city from Mr. J. W. Flavelle of a valuable building and eight pair of pheasants as an addition to the collection of animals, in Riverdale Park, that the thanks of this committee be forwarded to Mr. Flavelle for his generous gift, and that the Park Commissioner be instructed to place a tablet upon the building with the following inscription thereon: 'This building and the pheasants are the gift of Mr. J. W. Flavelle.'"

Lem's New Railway.

Lem Felcher applied for a space of not less than 100 yards in circumference to start a Hotchkiss radar bicycle race track, and that the Park Commissioner be instructed to place a tablet upon the building with the following inscription thereon: 'This building and the pheasants are the gift of Mr. J. W. Flavelle.'"

The Property Committee were granted a claim about 40 by 220 feet at the southwest corner of Stanley Park for a driving shed site. The rent is to be agreed upon.

Col. Ometz's letter respecting the mode of protecting boulevards on Queen's-avenue was referred to Park Commissioner Chambers. Chairman Score announced that the Board of Control, by cutting the estimates, had precluded this work.

Prof. Bonner is again to be in charge of Centre Island wharf.

Which is Right?

W. G. McKendrick, superintendent of Warrenton-Schwarz Paving Co., has reported to the denial of Manager Pearson of the Consumers' Gas Co., reaffirming his statement that occupying gas injuries to the pavement.

The Allocation sub-Committee of the Property Committee yesterday conferred with various county and judicial officials respecting the allotment of space at the new City Hall.

Ald. Woods, who so manfully attacked Ald. Hallam, an absent member of Council, Monday night with a statement that he sold a contractor stone and then beaten him in the measurement, is, however, a little out in his facts. It transpires that the stone, sold about 20 or more tons for the price of 25¢.

A largely signed petition is in for the extension of Noble-street at a cost of \$4000, to be made assessed.
