NEW CURE FOR CANCER.

Tuberculosis Also, It is said, shows Beneficial Results from the Use of Kalagaua.

Paris, July 18.—(N.Y. Herald.)—A new specific for tuberculosis and cancer has, it is reported, just been discovered. It is a drug that scarcely a week passes without some such discovery being reported. Nevertheless, as nothing ought to be rejected "a priori," we think it right to point out to the readers of the Herald a medicine which its promoters claim to be a cure for these two terrible diseases.

It is a South American plant, and grows in South America.

M. Ch. Fatin, a French chemist, who is a botanist and an explorer, is said to have made kalagaua with success in the treatment of bovine tuberculosis, and Dr. Alberto Restrepo has obtained excellent results from its use in the treatment of Dr. Stubbert of the London Hospital, at Liberty, N.Y., and Dr. Westcott, another American physician, claim to have effected cures of patients, whose recovery was deemed of.

Two Excellent Properties. Lastly, the Belgian doctors, Yessou Popelin, Hendricks and Coremans, announce that kalagaua has, to some extent, at least, realized the expectations they had formed of it.

Kalagaua is not poisonous. It stimulates nutrition and increases the weight. It is not for the moment a pronouncement on an opinion on kalagaua, but from the fact that it appears to stimulate nutrition and increase the weight, it certainly merits attention and enquiry.
