Rev. Malcolm McKinnon Inducted Into the Pastorate of Woodbridge and Vaughan Churches.

CHURCH CROWDED TO THE DOORS

The Sermon to the Congregation Preached By the Rev. Mr. McLaughlin.

Woodbridge, Nov. 19 .- The induction of Rev. Malcolm McKinnon into the pastorbridge and Knox Church, Vaughan, took place here this afternoon, under the most pleasing circumstances. The church was crowded to the doors, and the ceremony

sermon to the congregation was preached by Rev. Mr. McLaughlin, who, taking his text from Romans, chap. v., verses 5, 6 and 7, dwelt upon the conditions of success attendant upon a minister taking charge of a congregation. He spoke of the charge of a congregation. He spoke of the great necessity of obedience upon the part of the congregation, and instanced the command of the Saviour to the man with the withered hand, the paralytic, the ten the withered hand, the paralytic, the ten lepers, the blind man and the rich man, where obedience was demanded before recould be obtained.

A Little History. Rev. J. W. Rae, Moderator of the Pres-Rev. J. W. Rae, Moderator of the Presbytery, before inducting the minister, asked the clerk, Richard Tibb, to read a narrative of what had taken place since the resignation of Rev. W. Reid, on Nov. 25, 1900. Following Mr. Reid's resignation, a movement was started in favor of separating the parishes of Weston and Woodbridge. A similar movement was started to separate Boiton and Knox churches, and, on May 1, 1900, Woodbridge and Knox were united as one parish. A call was given to Rev. Malcolm McKinnon of Hillsburg, who was released by the Presbytery of Orangeville. The customary questions were put to the candidate, who was installed into the pastorate by the

call, believing he was divinely called. The attitude of the minister to the congregation was then dwelt upon, and the necessity of preaching a pure Gospel strongly urged. Purity in the home life and being a living example to his congregation were advised. "Keep thyself pure" said the rev. doctor. "Live near the fountain of all life, and you can draw a continual stream from it, making you a mighty power."

Mr. Reld, the late pastor, and the newly-inducted minister, who briefly appreciated the kind words said of him during the day, and spoke in cordial terms to his new congregation.
