MR. WALLACE REPLIES Letters of Principals Loudon and Burwash re Education.

Editor World: In the reply of Prinipal Loudon and Chancellor Burwash to a part of my criticism of their emorandum there are two or three things requiring attention.

1. I must correct the president and he chancellor in respect to one point. I made no assumption, illogical or other, concerning the opinions of the other, concerning the opinions of the signers of the memorandum. I was not dealing with their opinions in general, but with a scheme which they were advocating. That scheme proposed that candidates for specialist standing should be tested by a qualifying examination in their special subjects only. It provided no protection against candidates from inferior or illequipped schools, or schools where, owing to premature specialization, the training was ill-suited to prepare adequately for high school teaching. Their letter shows that they feel the force of my argument at this point.

2. They have shown a lack of definiteness of conception as to what their scheme involves. In the majority report they advocated for candidates "an examination—on the subjects of their special department, and also the professional examination prescribed at the close of their year's work in the Normal College." In the memorandum, answering the objection that the number of departmental examinations would be increased, they said, "by an adjustment of examinations it will be possible to secure the desired end without any addition in this direction.
