First Annual Games Were a Great Success.

The Western University Athletic Association held their first annual field day yesterday, and it was in every respect a decided success. The sports took place on the picturesque grounds surrounding the university, and were witnessed by nearly 400 students and their friends, who spared the contestants to no greater effort by words of encouragement, and made the air ring with cheers for the winners.

The enthusiasm subsided, but, at such times, though infrequent and of short duration, onlookers realized that the thermometer registered something below 70. The cheering and shouting dispelled all tendency one might have felt to shiver. Considering the late date, it was very fortunate that the weather was so favorable for conducting the games.

The sports commenced at 2 o'clock, and the sight of so many muscular, well-built young athletes putting forth every effort in good-natured rivalry was decidedly a sight to behold. The spectators included many of the fairer sex, some wearing their college gowns and "mortar boards," and London's beauty was well represented. College colors were in abundance, and from a tall flagstaff floated the Union Jack.

During the afternoon refreshments were served in the college, and the visitors in friendly groups forsook the sports for this attraction, and returned to the field more enthusiastic than ever.

The honors of the day went to the medical department. S. Thompson, of Strathroy, a first year man in medicine, won the championship, obtaining 41 points. C. McLeay, an second year, with 37 points, and D. Amott third with 18 points—both medicos.

Educational Matters,
Tenders for the Lorne Avenue School Piano.

Patching Up the Collegiate Institute Roof—Dr. Hutchinson Certifies to the Healthy Condition of the Children.

No. 2 committee of the Board of Education wrestled with tenders for a piano for Lorne avenue kindergarten school at its meeting last night. The eight tenders, which ranged from \$185 to \$275, were from the following houses: Heintzman, Nordheimer, Gerard-Heintzman, R. S. Williams, Bell Organ and Piano Company, Uxbridge, Dominion, and Karn. From these were selected the tenders of the Dominion, Uxbridge, Heintzman, and Nordheimer Companies, and a committee consisting of Trustees Gillson, Dr. Campbell, Bayly and Keenleyside was chosen to select a piano from the five named. They will meet on Thursday morning.

Mr. Webb, an old man who has for some years cut the school firewood, complained that another man had been given the job and wanted to know why. The committee decided to stop the wood saving and investigate the case, to find by whose authority, without the sanction of the committee, the man had been appointed.

A communication was read from the principal of St. George's school asking the board to deal liberally with a request from the janitor that in consequence of the recent building operations, he had been forced to take a great deal of extra work. On motion of Mr. Martyn, it was decided to pay him for this at the same rate he receives for ordinary work.

A report was received by the committee from a city doctor stating that in October a teacher had been taken ill with diphtheria, and he expressed the opinion that she had contracted the disease from one of the children. A letter from the medical officer of health (Dr. Hutchinson) was received contradicting this, and stating that there had not been a case of diphtheria within one-third of a mile of any school between Jan. 1 and Nov. 5, last.

He visited the school yesterday, and found all the children healthy, and expressed himself as greatly satisfied with the condition of general cleanliness.

The desirability of having a new roof for the Collegiate Institute was discussed at some length, but the general opinion of the committee was that it should be left to the next year's board. Meanwhile the roof will be mended. John Thompson will do \$5 worth of repairs and Mr. Boyd.

The members present were: E. N. Hunt (chairman), Bayly, Dr. Campbell, Gillson and Martyn.
