THEIR LAST.

London West Councilors Wind Up Their Business.

The final meeting of the London West Council of 1896 was held last night. It was called to wind up the affairs of the year, and leave a clean sheet for whoever will pilot the affairs of the village through the stormy sea of law and uncertainty next year.

Mrs. M. A. Perkins, in a letter to the council, stated that on Nov. 20, while she was walking along John street, she tripped and fell, in consequence of a defective sidewalk. The fall rendered her unconscious. She claims as damages, \$75. A letter from Dr. Fraleigh, A.M., stated that he had attended Mrs. Perkins and that in consequence of her fall she had been prevented from attending to her daily duties; she had also sustained a severe bruise over her eye, which might materially affect her sight; her knees had been injured, while her nervous system had received a severe shock. The claim was settled, Mrs. Perkins agreeing to accept \$25.

E. F. Johnston was reimbursed \$18 70 of taxes for 1896, he having lost his house by fire.

At the close of the meeting Mr. Moore wanted to know what provision had been made to meet the payment of \$830 falling due on Jan. 2.

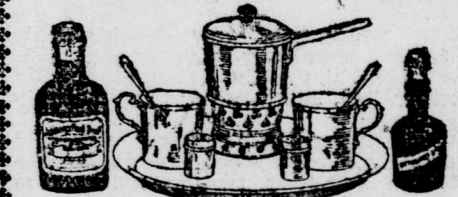

To Fight for Cuba

Two London Boys Will Join the Insurgent Army.

Enroll With a Volunteer Corps in St. Louis—Messrs. Brown and Johnson

Two London boys have enlisted for service against the Spaniards in Cuba. One is Holmes Brown, son of Mr. Wm. L. Brown, London (West), and the other Wilfrid Johnson, son of Rev. T. S. Johnson, of the Adelaide Street Baptist Church.

A volunteer corps to be sent to the assistance of the insurgent army in Cuba was recently formed in St. Louis, and among the first to enroll were Messrs. Brown and Johnson. The former was a corporal in the Seventh Battalion when here, and the latter was a sergeant in the militia at Brantford before removing to London.

The St. Louis Post-Dispatch warmly eulogizes the young men, who are British subjects, for thus risking their lives in the cause of Cuban liberty.

At a mass meeting of citizens the other night, the recruits were given an ovation. They will start for the front as soon as arrangements are completed for their transportation to Cuba, which is a dangerous and difficult task, as both the Spanish and American authorities must be circumvented.
