

"I saw where one of the readers of your page was asking for a recipe for any other vegetables. your page was asking for receptables. Here is one that is tried and true, and is good for corn, peas and beans. Nine cups of corn, peas or beans; one cup of sugar, one-half cup salt, one pint of hot water. Boil five minutes. Put in scalded cans and seal at once. When ready to use, drain off all liquid, rinse in cold water, set where it will heat in cold water, set where it will heat gradually, then boil five minutes. Drain again; then season. This has been used for years and is always good, and does not take so much fuel as using the boiler on a warm day."
