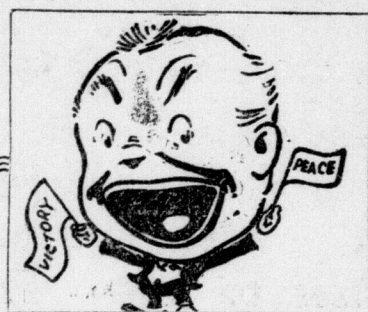


ONE IS SENTENCED TO SERVE 10 YEARS FOR KINDEL RIOTS

Four 4-Year Sentences — 26 Sentences Total 49 Years.

LONDON, July 16.—Canadian Associated Press.—The sentences by court-martial in connection with the Kinmel riots included one term of ten years, four men received five years and one two years.

The total period of detention for the 26 men whose sentences have already been promulgated amounts to 49 years. All the sentences imposed by the court-martial will be reviewed very shortly.

Germany Is Ready to Transfer Town Ceded to Belgium

PARIS, July 16.—Baron von Loesner, head of the German delegation, sent the inter-allied council today a note stating the German Government wished to meet Belgian representatives to discuss arrangements for the transfer of Malmédy, a town of Rhennish Prussia, awarded to Belgium by the terms of the peace treaty.

SIR EDWARD CARSON IS DENOUNCED IN BRITISH COMMONS

Bonar Law Regrets He Cannot Be Prosecuted.

MOTION IS DEFEATED

Attorney-General Announces There Are No Grounds For Action.

LONDON, July 16.—Sir Edward Carson's recent speech regarding Irish conditions came up in the House of Commons today. The attorney-general, Sir Gordon Hewart, announced that there were no grounds for setting the law in motion against Sir Edward for his threat to call out the Ulster Volunteers against Home Rule.

By a vote of 217 to 73 the House rejected a motion by J. R. Clynes, labor member, urging the Government to prosecute Sir Edward Carson for his speech of incitement to violence and breach of the law.

The debate turned on the legal point, in which the attorney-general said he had the concurrence of the solicitor-general. But almost all the speakers, without distinction of party, condemned the Carson speech. Sir Donald MacLean, Liberal, appealed to the Government to try to regain the moral authority of Parliament by condemning the language the Irish Unionist leader used.

Bonar Law, the Government spokesman, contended that the Government was bound to be guided by its legal advisers, though nothing could be more painful to him. If the Government had been advised that the law was broken he would have insisted on action being taken, or would have resigned. The whole thing was a very unfortunate affair, said Bonar Law.

Scored By the Press. Sir Edward Carson's speech on Saturday under the lash of the newspapers of all parties, primarily on account of his references to the United States, which are called tactics and calculated to breed bad blood between the nations, and secondly, because he reiterated his old threat to call out the Ulster Volunteers to resist any attempt to place the home rule act in operation.

The labor organs are not slow in pointing out how such incitement to "direct action" could be improved upon in the industrial field for securing political ends. The Liberal Irish papers are equally quick to point out that, in point of tactics, there is no difference between "King De Valera" and "King Carson."

The matter came up in the House of Commons tonight, when the Speaker, Mr. Robert Clynes, Laborite, permitted to move adjournment of the House for the purpose of challenging the Government to set the law in motion against Sir Edward Carson, for a speech inciting violence and endangering the safety of the realm. Mr. Clynes said there were many noisy, illiterate men now in prison for saying less harmful things than Carson had said. It was the Government's duty to see that the law was equitably applied.

Apostle of Direct Action. Mr. Clynes described Sir Edward Carson as the "arch-apostle of direct action."

Lord Hugh Cecil and other Unionist members condemned Carson's remarks as indefensible. The attorney-general, Sir Gordon Hewart, declared that the alleged breach of the law and violence had broken down. He said nothing in the speech in question, upon which it was possible to found legal proceedings. The passage referring to the calling out of the volunteers was hypothetical and contingent on dereliction of duty by the British subjects, and this nobody proposed to do.

However much the speech might be regretted at a time like this, there was no law which could be set in motion, as no offence had been committed.

HUNGARIAN SOVIET ARMY COMMANDER CAST INTO PRISON

Bela Kun's Reign Appears Nearing an End.

SEEKS TO ESCAPE

Likely To Leave Hungary Never To Return.

Vienna, July 16.—There is a crisis in the Hungarian soviet. Gen. Boehm, commander of the army, has been imprisoned. Reports have been circulated that his health required rest in a sanatorium. Stumfeld, second in command, is reported to have fled.

Statements that Bela Kun, the soviet leader, had been invited to a conference by the Allies, has given rise to reports that he has accepted this subterfuge as a means of escaping from Hungary without the intention of returning. If he denied, however, that he has left Hungary thus far, or even departed from the capital.

WINNIPEG'S TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL FOR ONE BIG UNION

Initial Steps Are Taken To Promulgate Policy.

PROTEST IS UNAVAILING

Dominion Trades Congress Representative Pleads in Vain.

WINNIPEG, July 16.—A vote to a great extent committing the Winnipeg Trades and Labor Council to the one big union was passed at the regular meeting of that body last night. It was not unanimous, several of the representatives who had not received instructions from their respective unions refrained from voting. As a result of the decision initial steps were taken to promulgate the policy in government of labor union affairs.

R. A. Rigg Protests. Prior to the taking of the vote, R. A. Rigg, recently appointed organizer for Western Canada of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress, addressed the body in opposition to the one big union proposal.

Mr. Rigg said that, while there were changes that were needed in the formation of their economic organization in order to make this more effective in the interest of the worker, in his opinion the best policy to adopt was to advocate these changes inside the organization and in that way bring the movement along as a whole. Otherwise, it was inevitable that a split would take place in the ranks of organized labor and the energies of the organizers would be frittered away in strife between themselves.

Many Changes Coming. The mind of the movement, was said Mr. Rigg, always susceptible to the influence of new ideas. Many changes had taken place in the past and rapid progress was being made in preparing the movement for other changes.

Mr. Rigg warned them against the danger of overestimating the power of their economic organization to accomplish any drastic improvement, and urged upon his hearers to concentrate more of their activities upon the political field.

COURT-MARTIAL FOR STRIKING OFFICER MANY MONTHS AGO

Protest Is Raised in Behalf of Ex-Gunner.

CAN PREPARE A DEFENSE

Friends Claim Government Has Let Time Pass So As To Secure Evidence.

KINGSTON, July 16.—This morning a court-martial convened at the Barracks for the purpose of placing on trial Ex-Gunner James Mossman of the First Battery, C.R.E., but the case was paraded until tomorrow morning. Gunner Mossman is charged with striking a superior officer in Belgium on November 18, 1918. The case against Mossman was allowed to drift. He went into German territory, then back to England in March, 1919, and from England to Canada. On March 29 Mossman was discharged and returned to his home in Belleville.

On May 2 Mossman was arrested by the military police and brought to Kingston, being detained under arrest at the barracks after the usual summary of evidence was taken. He was on Monday afternoon ordered to be ready for trial on Wednesday morning. His friends objected to the notice to prepare for trial. They claimed that the Government had held Mossman from May 9 against him and that he should be given a reasonable time to have his defence prepared. The Government refused. Then W. F. Nickle, M.P., wired a vigorous protest to Ottawa, and the court should be asked for sufficient time for Mossman to prepare a defence. It had been concluded that man is a civilian and cannot be tried by court-martial, but the department of the justice advocate general has decided to the contrary.

FARMER DIES IN COURT AFTER HE KILLED A MAN

Shooting Affair Has a Startling Sequel in Collingwood.

COLLINGWOOD, July 16.—Under especially peculiar circumstances a double tragedy was enacted here today. It began on the farm of Amos Sherrick, on the outskirts of the town early today when Sherrick fired a shot at a young man named John Mooney, whom he found in his pithy, and who was endeavoring to make his escape from the place.

It ended by the sudden death of Sherrick in police custody when, standing before Police Magistrate Hogg, preparing to listen to the formal charge of murder which had been laid against him by the police.

Mooney was a returned soldier, about thirty years of age. Sherrick was in his 65th year, and had been a resident of Nottawasaga Township for many years. He was a very quiet man and highly respected.

The shock of the death of Mooney undoubtedly caused his death.

CONCILIATION BOARD ON TORONTO BAKERS' CASE

OTTAWA, July 16.—The minister of labor has appointed a board of conciliation to settle the dispute between some twenty master bakers of Toronto and their bread drivers. There are about 600 men directly and 800 indirectly involved in the dispute. The men were on strike, but have now gone back to work.

As the firms involved were not public utility corporations, a board could be established only by mutual consent of the disputing parties. The master bakers have appointed F. H. McGuigan of Toronto as their representative on the board, and W. Clay will represent the men. They will select the chairman, on failing an agreement, he will be appointed by the minister.

LONDON DOCTOR IS NEW MEDICAL HEAD OF RE-ESTABLISHMENT

Col. E. G. Davis, C.M.C., M.D., Succeeds Bell.

GOOD SERVICE IN WAR

Did Duty in Mediterranean Area, France and British Isles.

OTTAWA, July 16.—Col. E. G. Davis, C. M. G., M. D., who has been appointed as medical director of medical services for the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment, replacing Lieut. Col. F. McKelvey Bell, who recently resigned, is a son of the late Dean of Huron and a resident of London, Ont.

Previous to the war he held the position of clinician of Western University Medical College, and was for many years actively connected with the Canadian militia, being officer commanding the 15th Field Ambulance since the year 1904.

In 1915 he went overseas as a junior officer with number 2 stationary hospital. He was sent out to Lemnos on the Mediterranean and was later recalled to England, appointed colonel and sent to France to take charge of No. 3 hospital at Doullens. From there he was again recalled and assigned to the post of O. C. of the Shorncliffe Military Hospital. He was twice mentioned in despatches and in recognition of his services and ability was awarded the C. M. G.

Since his return from overseas Col. Davis has been A. D. M. S. at Regina and has served as unit medical director for the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment at Montreal.

HAMILTON WOMAN IS FOUND BACK OF STORE BOUND HAND AND FOOT

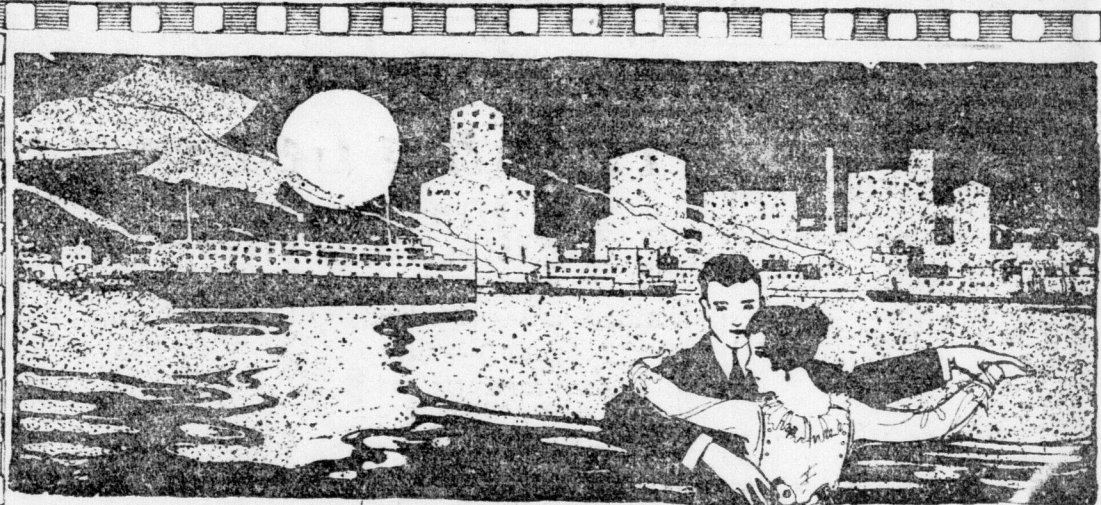

FIRST HUMANE SOCIETY MEDAL FOR OWEN SOUND MAN; SAVED TWO GIRLS

OWEN SOUND, July 16.—The first Royal Humane Society medal for lifesaving ever presented in Owen Sound will be presented on Saturday to Neil Kennedy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Kennedy Jun., for his heroic action in saving the lives of two little girls on the Upper Sydenham River on January 23.

The little girls are cousins, aged 10 and 11, and are the daughters of Messrs. Will and E. E. Irving.

The presentation will be made by Mayor Webster, following the program arranged for Saturday morning in Queen's Park in celebration of the signing of peace. Neil Kennedy, the recipient of the medal, is one of the model boys of the town. He is a student of the Owen Sound Collegiate Institute in the fifth form, and an active member of the Y. M. C. A., where he is one of the leaders in junior boys' work.

The action for which the medal was awarded occurred on January 23, when he and Miss Dorothy Fairley were walking on Second avenue, and heard cries for help from the little girls, who had broken through the ice in the river, which kept breaking under their weight as they tried to climb out, and they were soon in deep water and a strong current. Crawling out on the ice, Neil Kennedy, who secured the children one by one, and passed them back to Miss Fairley.

SOLDIERS LIBERATED FROM KINGSTON JAIL

KINGSTON, July 16.—Acting on instructions from Toronto that all soldiers prisoners convicted under the Ontario temperance act were to be released by July 15, the local jailer has released four men, three of whom had about two months to serve, while the fourth had about three weeks.
