FLIERS MAKE READY TO START RETURN TRIP ACROSS U.S.

Lieut. B. W. Maynard, the "Flying Parson," Is Leading Contestants.

Mineola, N. Y., Oct. 14 .- With 12 of the 62 original starters safely accross the continent and preparing to start the return flight the first half of the army air service transcontinental race between Mineola and San Fancisco entered on its final phase today. By sundown it was expected that the majority of the remaining contestants would have checked in at two control stations. Only two of the fifteen original San Francisco starters still in the race remain to check in at Mineola. Five already have arrived and the other eight have been forced out along the route by accidents.

Of the score or more of westbound flers still in the race, nearly all had reached or passed Chicago, and the majority were within a day's flight of San Fracisco.

LEPERS COMPLETELY CURED OF DISEASE

Honolulu, Hawaii, Oct. 4.— Correspondence of the Associated Press.— Announcement has been made here that complete cures of leprosy are being made at the Kallini Territorial Hospital in this city, and that within the past few months 20 patients have been paroled, without one recurrence of the disease.

Blood tests of the discharged patients have revealed no trace of the leprosy germ. Patients now under treatment are showing marked improvement. Chaulmoogra oil, which is obt ined from the seeds of the taraxogenes kurzii, for 50 years known as the specific cure for leprosy, was the only medicine used in effecting the cures, the oil having been perfected by a refining process discovered by Dr. A. L. Dean, professor of chemistry and president of the University of Hawaii.

BOMB MANUFACTURER BRITISH TROOPS PUT UNDER ARREST

Evidence Secured That Clears Up Recent Terrorist Plots.

Chicago, Oct. 14 .- Federal authorities at Gary, Ind., where military control was established by Major-Gen. Leonard Wood, after the situation growing out of the strike of steel workers became too threatening for state authorities to handle, have arrested the alleged maker of the bomb exploded on the night of June 3 last, in the doorway of the home of A.
