The city firemen are willing to meet he city council half way in their demands for a day off each week. The men have a proposition which they believe will appeal to the city fathers.
They are willing to include 12 hours of
their own time if the city will grant
them another 12 to make the 24 hours
off. Their plan is: When a man is on
a day shift that the city grant him 12
hours off the day following, and incorporating his own night of 12 hours
with the 12 granted by the city it
would give him 24 hours. When he returns to work he will then be on the
night shift instead of the day, and
vice versa when a man is working on
the night shift. This plan will give the
men a change of shifts each week instead of once every two weeks, as it is
now. On this basis only five new men
